RECOMMENDED ACTION

1) 1) Approve an amendment to the agreement with Van Lant & Fankhanel, LLP (VLF) to extend audit services for the City of Buena Park for a period of three years, with an option to extend for an additional two; 2) Authorize the City Manager and the City Attorney to make any necessary, non-monetary changes to the amendment; and, 3) Authorize the City Manager and the City Clerk to execute an amendment to the Professional Services Agreement.

PREVIOUS CITY COUNCIL ACTION

On June 23, 2021, the City Council approved a professional services agreement with Van Lant & Fankhanel, LLP (VLF) to provide independent audit services for the City of Buena Park following a competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) process. VLF was selected based on the firm's governmental auditing expertise, technical qualifications, partner involvement, service approach, and competitive pricing. The agreement included audit services for the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR), Single Audit requirements, internal control and compliance reporting, the Buena Park Foundation audit, Appropriations Limit reporting, and preparation of the California State Controller's Financial Transactions Report. The original agreement provided for an initial three-year term with an option for additional two-year extension at the City's discretion.

DISCUSSION

The City annually undergoes an independent audit of its financial records in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and applicable state and federal requirements. Audit services include the examination of the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR), Single Audit reporting requirements, Appropriations Limit reporting, internal control and compliance testing, required communications to management and the City Council, and other related financial reporting services.

In 2021, following a competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) process, the City selected Van Lant & Fankhanel, LLP (VLF) to serve as the City's independent auditors based on the firm's governmental auditing expertise, technical knowledge, service approach, partner involvement, and competitive pricing. Over the past five years, VLF has consistently provided the City with responsive, professional, and high-quality audit services while maintaining strong communication and collaboration with City staff throughout the audit process.

VLF has also supported the City in navigating evolving accounting and financial reporting requirements, including implementation and interpretation of Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements and federal compliance requirements. As such, the firm routinely provides technical assistance, practical recommendations, and timely guidance to Finance staff throughout the year. This continuity in audit oversight and technical support is particularly important in maintaining strict compliance with external reporting expectations, including those associated with agreements involving other agencies, where the City's ability to consistently demonstrate accurate and fairly presented financial statements is critical to the ongoing fulfillment of compliance requirements.

In addition, VLF has distinguished itself from other firms due to the direct involvement of the firm's partners during the audit engagement. Unlike many audit firms that rely heavily on junior audit staff, much of the City's audit work is performed directly by VLF partners and senior-level professionals. This approach provides the City with experienced oversight, timely issue resolution, stronger technical guidance, and greater overall efficiency throughout the audit process.

Staff is recommending approval of a three-year contract extension with VLF because the firm has demonstrated exceptional performance and continues to provide significant value to the City. VLF has developed a strong understanding of the City's financial operations, accounting systems, internal controls, and reporting requirements, which has resulted in efficient audit execution and continuity in financial reporting. Retaining the City's current auditors avoids the substantial transition time, additional staff workload, and heavy institutional learning curve associated with onboarding a new audit firm. Maintaining the existing engagement allows Finance staff to focus on financial reporting and budgeting, system improvements, and operational priorities rather than diverting resources to onboarding activities. It also helps avoid costly delays, confusion, or miscommunication that can happen when a new firm has to learn the City's systems and processes.

There are benefits to introducing a new perspective, process, or methodology applied to the audit of the financial statements and the related review of internal financial controls. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) recognizes that auditor independence may be maintained through safeguards such as engagement partner rotation and second partner review procedures without requiring replacement of the entire audit firm. The Sarbanes - Oxley Act also similarly recommends a lead audit partner rotation every five years to enhance auditor independence.

Consistent with these best practices, VLF will rotate audit engagement partners as part of the proposed extension in order to provide a fresh perspective and additional oversight while preserving the institutional knowledge and operational efficiencies developed over the past five years. Staff believes this approach appropriately balances auditor independence, continuity, efficiency, and service quality.

Under the proposed amendment, VLF would continue providing audit services for fiscal years ending June 30, 2026, 2027, and 2028, with annual fees as follows:

Fiscal Year 2025-26: \$37,225

Fiscal Year 2026-27: \$38,190

Fiscal Year 2027-28: \$39,110

The total cost for the three-year extension is \$114,525. The agreement also includes an option for the City to extend services for an additional two years subject to future City approval.

BUDGET IMPACT

The total cost of the proposed three-year agreement extension is \$114,525, with annual costs of \$37,225 in FY 2025-26, \$38,190 in FY 2026-27, and \$39,110 in FY 2027-28. Funding for audit services is included in the City Council's operating budget and will be incorporated into future fiscal year budget requests as part of the City's annual budget process.

**AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO
PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT
WITH VAN LANT & FANKHANEL, LLP**

This Amendment to Professional Services Agreement ("Amendment") dated _____, is between the City of Buena Park, a California municipal corporation ("CITY") and Van Lant & Fankhanel, LLP ("CONSULTANT"). CITY and CONSULTANT are at times referred to herein jointly as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party."

WHEREAS, the Parties previously entered into that certain Professional Services Agreement FIN2021-2, dated July 27, 2021, (the "Agreement"), pursuant to which CITY contracted with CONSULTANT to provide the "Services" defined in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the term of the Agreement is scheduled to expire and the Parties, being mutually satisfied with the other's performance, now desire to amend the Agreement to extend the term for an additional three years and increase the compensation to be paid CONSULTANT during the extended term, subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW THEREFORE, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Amendment shall be effective as of June 1, 2026.
2. **SCOPE OF SERVICES.** Section 2.0 of the Agreement is hereby entirely deleted and replaced with the following:

2.0 SCOPE OF SERVICES.

Subject to the terms and conditions in this Agreement, CONSULTANT shall provide to CITY those services that are specifically described in Exhibit "A" (the "Services"). CITY may request changes or expansion of the Services (each a "Modification") and in such cases the Modification to the Services and any resulting increase or decrease in the Compensation to be paid CONSULTANT shall be documented in a written amendment to this Agreement. Increases or decreases in Compensation resulting from any Modification to the Services shall be based on the rate specified in Exhibit A, or if not specified therein at then-applicable prevailing market rate charged by CONSULTANT to similar customers for the same service.

3. **TERM.** Section 4.0 of the Agreement is hereby entirely deleted and replaced with the following:

4.0 TERM. The term of this Agreement shall commence on _____, and remain in full force and effect until **May 31, 2029**, unless sooner terminated as provided in Section 10 of the Agreement. At the CITY's option, the term may be extended for two additional renewal terms of one year each.

4. **COMPENSATION.** Section 5.0 of the Agreement is hereby entirely deleted and replaced with the following:

5.0 COMPENSATION. As full and complete consideration for CONSULTANT's performing the Services, CITY shall pay CONSULTANT the following "NOT-TO-EXCEED" amounts as further detailed in Exhibit "A": (1) \$37,225 for the FY2025-26 audit; (2) \$38,190

for the FY2026-27 audit; and (3) \$39,110 for the FY2027-28 audit; and, if CITY exercises the option to extend the term, (4) \$39,980 for the FY2028-29 audit; and (5) \$40,720 for FY2029-30 audit. No claims for additional compensation shall be allowed unless authorized in advance by the CITY in writing. Any additional work or expenses authorized by the CITY shall be compensated at the rates set forth in Exhibit A, or, if not specified, at a rate agreed to by the Parties.

5. **EXHIBITS.** Exhibit "A" to this Amendment shall replace and supersede Exhibit "A" to the Agreement.
6. **INCORPORATION.** Except as expressly modified by this Amendment, all other terms, conditions, and provisions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect and are incorporated fully herein by this reference.

We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the services we are to provide the City of Buena Park (City) for the year ending June 30, 2026.

Audit Scope and Objectives

We will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information, including the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements, of the City as of and for the year ending June 30, 2026. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States of America provide for certain required supplementary information (RSI), such as management's discussion and analysis (MD&A), to supplement the City's and Plan's basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to the City's and Plan's RSI in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. These limited procedures will consist of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We will not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance. The following RSI is required by generally accepted accounting principles and will be subjected to certain limited procedures, but will not be audited:

- 1) Management's Discussion and Analysis
- 2) Budgetary comparison schedules.
- 3) OPEB and Pension RSI.

We have also been engaged to report on supplementary information other than RSI that accompanies the City's and Plan's financial statements. We will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and we will provide an opinion on it in relation to the financial statements as a whole, in a report combined with our auditor's report on the financial statements:

- 1) Schedule of expenditures of federal awards.
- 2) Combining schedules.

In connection with our audit of the basic financial statements, we will read the following other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the basic financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

- 1) Introductory Section
- 2) Statistical Section

The objectives of our audit are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions about whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with GAAP, and report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements, including omissions, can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment of a reasonable user made based on the financial statements. The objectives also include reporting on:

- Internal control over financial reporting and compliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and award agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- Internal control over compliance related to major programs and an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards that could have a direct and material effect on each major program in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance).

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements and Single Audit

We will conduct our audit in accordance with GAAS; the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996; and the provisions of the Uniform Guidance, and will include tests of accounting records, a determination of major program(s) in accordance with Uniform Guidance, and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such opinions. As part of an audit in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We will evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management. We will also evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and determine whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the government or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the government. Because the determination of waste and abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to perform specific procedures to detect waste or abuse in financial audits nor do they expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting waste or abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements or noncompliance may not be detected by us, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements or on major programs. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management of any material errors, any fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that come to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential. We will include such matters in the reports required for a Single Audit. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

We will also conclude, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the government's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, tests of the physical existence of inventories, and direct confirmation of receivables and certain assets and liabilities

by correspondence with selected individuals, funding sources, creditors, and financial institutions. We will also request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement.

We have identified the following significant risk of material misstatement as part of our audit planning. According to GAAS, significant risks include management override of controls. Accordingly, we have considered management override of controls as a significant risk.

We may, from time to time and depending on the circumstances, use third-party service providers in serving your account. We may share confidential information about you with these service providers but remain committed to maintaining the confidentiality and security of your information. Accordingly, we maintain internal policies, procedures, and safeguards to protect the confidentiality of your personal information. In addition, we will secure confidentiality agreements with all service providers to maintain the confidentiality of your information and we will take reasonable precautions to determine that they have appropriate procedures in place to prevent the unauthorized release of your confidential information to others. In the event that we are unable to secure an appropriate confidentiality agreement, you will be asked to provide your consent prior to the sharing of your confidential information with the third-party service provider. Furthermore, we will remain responsible for the work provided by any such third-party service providers.

Our audit of financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

We will also provide a report on agreed upon procedures performed on the City's calculation of its annual appropriations limit as required by Article XIII B of the California State Constitution. We will perform the procedures in the Article XIII B Appropriations Limit Uniform Guidelines as published by the League of California Cities. This report will include a statement that the report is intended solely for the information and use of management, City Council and specific legislative or regulatory bodies and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Audit Procedures—Internal Control

We will obtain an understanding of the government and its environment, including internal control relevant to the audit, sufficient to identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to error or fraud, and to design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and obtain evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinions. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentation, or the override of internal control. Tests of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting errors and fraud that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from illegal acts and other noncompliance matters that have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

As required by the Uniform Guidance, we will perform tests of controls over compliance to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of controls that we consider relevant to preventing or detecting material noncompliance with compliance requirements applicable to each major federal award program. However, our tests will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on those controls and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. Accordingly, we will express no such opinion. However, during the audit, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance internal control related matters that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance.

Audit Procedures—Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of the City's and Plan's compliance with provisions of applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and agreements, including grant agreements. However, the objective of those procedures will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Uniform Guidance requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the auditee has complied with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards applicable to major programs. Our procedures will consist of tests of transactions and other applicable procedures described in the *OMB Compliance Supplement* for the types of compliance requirements that could have a direct

and material effect on each of the City's major programs. The purpose of these procedures will be to express an opinion on the City's compliance with requirements applicable to each of its major programs in our report on compliance issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

Other Services

We will also assist in preparing the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes of the City and Plan in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and the Uniform Guidance based on information provided by you. These nonaudit services do not constitute an audit under *Government Auditing Standards* and such services will not be conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. We will perform the services in accordance with applicable professional standards. The other services are limited to the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes services previously defined. We, in our sole professional judgment, reserve the right to refuse to perform any procedure or take any action that could be construed as assuming management responsibilities.

You agree to assume all management responsibilities for the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes, and any other nonaudit services we provide. You will be required to acknowledge in the management representation letter our assistance with preparation of the financial statements, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes and that you have reviewed and approved the financial statements, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes prior to their issuance and have accepted responsibility for them. Further, you agree to oversee the nonaudit services by designating an individual, preferably from senior management, with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience; evaluate the adequacy and results of those services; and accept responsibility for them.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements and Single Audit

Our audit will be conducted on the basis that you acknowledge and understand your responsibility for (1) designing, implementing, establishing, and maintaining effective internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, including internal controls over federal awards, and for evaluating and monitoring ongoing activities to help ensure that appropriate goals and objectives are met; (2) following laws and regulations; (3) ensuring that there is reasonable assurance that government programs are administered in compliance with compliance requirements; and (4) ensuring that management and financial information is reliable and properly reported. Management is also responsible for implementing systems designed to achieve compliance with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements. You are also responsible for the selection and application of accounting principles; for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and all accompanying information in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for compliance with applicable laws and regulations (including federal statutes), rules, and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements (including award agreements). Your responsibilities also include identifying significant contractor relationships in which the contractor has responsibility for program compliance and for the accuracy and completeness of that information.

You are also responsible for making drafts of financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, all financial records, and related information available to us and for the accuracy and completeness of that information (including information from outside of the general and subsidiary ledgers). You are also responsible for providing us with (1) access to all information of which you are aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, such as records, documentation, identification of all related parties and all related-party relationships and transactions, and other matters; (2) access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed to perform an audit under the Uniform Guidance; (3) additional information that we may request for the purpose of the audit; and (4) unrestricted access to persons within the government from whom we determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about the financial statements; schedule of expenditures of federal awards; federal award programs; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and related matters.

Your responsibilities include adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements and confirming to us in the management representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements of each opinion unit taken as a whole.

You are responsible for the design and implementation of programs and controls to prevent and detect fraud, and for informing us about all known or suspected fraud affecting the government involving (1) management, (2) employees who have significant roles in internal control, and (3) others where the fraud could have a material effect

on the financial statements. Your responsibilities include informing us of your knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the government received in communications from employees, former employees, grantors, regulators, or others. In addition, you are responsible for identifying and ensuring that the government complies with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, agreements, and grants. You are also responsible for taking timely and appropriate steps to remedy fraud and noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that we report. Additionally, as required by the Uniform Guidance, it is management's responsibility to evaluate and monitor noncompliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards; take prompt action when instances of noncompliance are identified including noncompliance identified in audit findings; promptly follow up and take corrective action on reported audit findings; and prepare a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a separate corrective action plan.

You are responsible for identifying all federal awards received and understanding and complying with the compliance requirements and for the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards (including notes and noncash assistance received, and COVID-19-related concepts, such as lost revenues, if applicable) in conformity with the Uniform Guidance. You agree to include our report on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards. You also agree to [include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards that includes our report thereon OR make the audited financial statements readily available to intended users of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards no later than the date the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is issued with our report thereon]. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (2) you believe the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, including its form and content, is stated fairly in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards.

You are also responsible for the preparation of the other supplementary information, which we have been engaged to report on, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). You agree to include our report on the supplementary information in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on, the supplementary information. You also agree to [include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the supplementary information that includes our report thereon OR make the audited financial statements readily available to users of the supplementary information no later than the date the supplementary information is issued with our report thereon]. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the supplementary information in accordance with GAAP; (2) you believe the supplementary information, including its form and content, is fairly presented in accordance with GAAP; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the supplementary information.

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining a process for tracking the status of audit findings and recommendations. Management is also responsible for identifying and providing report copies of previous financial audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or other studies related to the objectives discussed in the Audit Scope and Objectives section of this letter. This responsibility includes relaying to us corrective actions taken to address significant findings and recommendations resulting from those audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or studies. You are also responsible for providing management's views on our current findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as your planned corrective actions for the report, and for the timing and format for providing that information.

Engagement Administration, Fees, and Other

We understand that your employees will prepare all cash, accounts receivable, or other confirmations and schedules we request and will locate any documents selected by us for testing.

At the conclusion of the engagement, we will complete the appropriate sections of the Data Collection Form that summarizes our audit findings. It is management's responsibility to electronically submit the reporting package (including financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, summary schedule of prior audit findings, auditors' reports, and corrective action plan) along with the Data Collection Form to the federal audit clearinghouse. We will coordinate with you the electronic submission and certification. The Data Collection Form and the reporting package must be submitted within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditors' reports or nine months after the end of the audit period.

We will provide copies of our reports to the City; however, management is responsible for distribution of the reports and the financial statements. Unless restricted by law or regulation, or containing privileged and confidential information, copies of our reports are to be made available for public inspection.

The audit documentation for this engagement is the property of VLF, LLP and constitutes confidential information. However, subject to applicable laws and regulations, audit documentation and appropriate individuals will be made available upon request and in a timely manner to the Oversight Agency or its designee, a federal agency providing direct or indirect funding, or the U.S. Government Accountability Office for purposes of a quality review of the audit, to resolve audit findings, or to carry out oversight responsibilities. We will notify you of any such request. If requested, access to such audit documentation will be provided under the supervision of VLF, LLP personnel. Furthermore, upon request, we may provide copies of selected audit documentation to the aforementioned parties. These parties may intend, or decide, to distribute the copies or information contained therein to others, including other governmental agencies.

The audit documentation for this engagement will be retained for a minimum of seven years after the report release date or for any additional period requested by the Oversight Agency for Audit, or Pass-through Entity. If we are aware that a federal awarding agency, pass-through entity, or auditee is contesting an audit finding, we will contact the party(ies) contesting the audit finding for guidance prior to destroying the audit documentation.

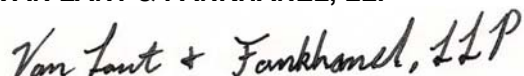

RECOMMENDED ACTION

1) Adopt a resolution approving the 2025 Water Shortage Contingency Plan; 2) Adopt a resolution approving the 2025 Urban Water Management Plan; and 3) Adopt an ordinance amending Chapter 13.28 (Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program) of the Buena Park Municipal Code.

PREVIOUS CITY COUNCIL ACTION

None.

DISCUSSION

The City of Buena Park (City), as an urban water supplier, is required by the Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP) Act of 1983 (Act) to update and submit a UWMP to the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) every five years. The Final Draft UWMP for this public hearing is attached to this staff report as Attachment 1. The 2025 UWMP contains all elements to be compliant with the new requirements of the Act, as amended in 2020. A UWMP is a comprehensive document that presents an evaluation of a water supplier's reliability over a long-term horizon. The 2025 UWMP provides an assessment of the present and future water supply sources and demands within the City's service area, including water resource needs, water-use efficiency programs, water reliability assessment, and strategies to mitigate water shortage conditions. It also presents an updated 2025 Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) designed to prepare for and respond to water shortages. The Final Draft WSCP for this public hearing is attached to this staff report as Attachment 2.

The WSCP provides the steps and water shortage response actions to be taken in times of water shortage conditions. The WSCP has prescriptive elements, such as an analysis of water supply reliability; the water shortage response actions for each of the six standard water shortage levels; an estimate of potential to close supply gap for each measure; protocols and procedures to communicate identified actions for any current or predicted water shortage conditions; procedures for an Annual Assessment; monitoring and reporting requirements to determine customer compliance; and reevaluation and improvement procedures for evaluating the WSCP. This level of detailed planning and preparation is intended to help maintain reliable supplies and reduce the impacts of supply interruptions. Although an appendix to the UWMP, DWR requires the WSCP be treated as a stand-alone document with its own public hearing and adoption, and shall be adopted prior to the UWMP to be included within the Adopted UWMP.

To ensure the WSCP is legally enforceable, the City proposes amending Chapter 13.28 (Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program) of the Buena Park Municipal Code to enact water conservation and water shortage contingency rules and regulations to ensure and maximize the reasonable, efficient, and beneficial use of the City's water supply. It codifies permanent water conservation measures, considered Level 0 in the WSCP, and outlines the procedures to declare, adjust, or terminate water shortage declarations that could impose or rescind additional conservation measures. It also defines penalties for customer non-compliance with conservation measures. The proposed amendment is attached to the staff report as Attachment 3.

The City elected to utilize a Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC) led team of regionally-focused consultants to assist in the preparation of the 2025 UWMP, WSCP, and ordinance amendment along with other MWDOC member agencies. This approach ensured that all requirements were met in a manner consistent with other water suppliers in Orange County.

Notices of preparation were sent to surrounding agencies notifying them that the City was in the process of updating its UWMP and WSCP. Additionally, prior to this public hearing, copies of the 2025 UWMP, 2025 WSCP, and proposed ordinance amendments were made available for review in the City Clerk's Office and on the City's website.

Staff recommends the adoption of the resolutions approving the final draft of the City's 2025 UWMP (Attachment 1) and the 2025 WSCP (Attachment 2) and adoption of the ordinance amendment.

PUBLIC NOTIFICATION

On May 21, 2026, the first public hearing notice was posted at Buena Park City Hall, Ehlers Event Center, and Orange County Fire Authority Station No. 61. The same notice was also published in the *Buena Park Independent* on May 22, 2026. Due to state requirements to provide two public notifications, a second public hearing notice was posted at the same locations on May 28, 2026, and published in the *Buena Park Independent* on May 29, 2026.

BUDGET IMPACT

There is no budgetary impact associated with adopting the UWMP, WSCP, or ordinance.

SECTION 1 INTRODUCTION AND WSCP OVERVIEW

The Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) is a strategic planning document designed to prepare for and respond to water shortages. This WSCP complies with California Water Code (Water Code) Section 10632, which requires that every Urban Water Supplier (Supplier) shall prepare and adopt a WSCP as part of its Urban Water Management Plan (UWMP). This level of detailed planning and preparation is intended to help maintain reliable supplies and reduce the impacts of supply interruptions.

The WSCP is the City of Buena Park's (City) operating manual that is used to prevent catastrophic service disruptions through proactive, rather than reactive, management. A water shortage, when the water supply available is insufficient to meet the normally expected customer water use at a given point in time, may occur due to a number of reasons, such as drought, climate change, and catastrophic events. This plan provides a structured guide for the City to deal with water shortages, incorporating prescriptive information and standardized action levels, along with implementation actions in the event of a catastrophic supply interruption. This way, if and when shortage conditions arise, the City's governing body, its staff, and the public can easily identify and efficiently implement pre-determined steps to manage a water shortage. A well-structured WSCP allows real-time water supply availability assessment and structured steps designed to respond to actual conditions, enabling efficient management of any shortage with predictability and accountability.

The WSCP also describes the City's procedures for conducting an Annual Water Supply and Demand Assessment (AWSDA) that is required by Water Code Section 10632.1 and is to be submitted to the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) on or before July 1 of each year, or within 14 days of receiving final allocations from the State Water Project (SWP), whichever is later. The City's 2025 WSCP is included as an appendix to its 2025 UWMP which will be submitted to DWR by July 1, 2026. However, while developed in conjunction with the UWMP, this WSCP is a standalone document and can be amended, as needed, without amending the UWMP. Furthermore, the Water Code does not prohibit a Supplier from taking actions not specified in its WSCP, if needed, without having to formally amend its UWMP or WSCP.

1.1 Water Shortage Contingency Plan Requirements and Organization

The WSCP provides the steps and water shortage response actions to be taken in times of water shortage conditions. The WSCP has prescriptive elements, such as an analysis of water supply reliability; the water shortage response actions for each of the six standard water shortage levels that correspond to water shortage percentages ranging from 10 percent to greater than 50 percent; an estimate of potential to close supply gap for each measure; protocols and procedures to communicate identified actions for any current or predicted water shortage conditions; procedures for an AWSDA; monitoring and reporting requirements to determine customer compliance; and reevaluation and improvement procedures for evaluating the WSCP.

This WSCP is organized into three main sections, with Section 3 aligned with Water Code Section 16032 requirements:

Section 1 Introduction and WSCP Overview gives an overview of the WSCP fundamentals.

Section 2 Background Information provides a background on the City's water service area.

Section 3 Water Shortage Contingency Preparedness and Response Planning.

Section 3.1 Water Supply Reliability Analysis provides a summary of the water supply analysis and water reliability findings from the 2025 UWMP.

Section 3.2 Annual Water Supply and Demand Assessment Procedures provides a description of procedures to conduct and approve the AWSDA.

Section 3.3 Six Standard Water Shortage Stages explains the WSCP's six standard water shortage levels corresponding to progressive ranges of up to 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, and more than 50 percent shortages.

Section 3.4 Shortage Response Actions describes the WSCP's shortage response actions that align with the defined shortage levels.

Section 3.5 Communication Protocols addresses communication protocols and procedures to inform customers, the public, interested parties, and local, regional, and state governments, regarding any current or predicted shortages and any resulting shortage response actions.

Section 3.6 Compliance and Enforcement describes customer compliance, enforcement, appeal, and exemption procedures for triggered shortage response actions.

Section 3.7 Legal Authorities describes the legal authorities that enable the City to implement and enforce its shortage response actions.

Section 3.8 Financial Consequences of the WSCP provides a description of the financial consequences of and responses for drought conditions.

Section 3.9 Monitoring and Reporting describes monitoring and reporting requirements and procedures that ensure appropriate data is collected, tracked, and analyzed for purposes of monitoring customer compliance and to meet state reporting requirements.

Section 3.10 WSCP Refinement Procedures addresses reevaluation and improvement procedures for monitoring and evaluating the functionality of the WSCP.

Section 3.11 Special Water Feature Distinction provides a required definition for inclusion in a WSCP per the Water Code.

Section 3.12 Plan Adoption, Submittal, and Availability describes the process the City followed to adopt its WSCP.

1.2 Integration With Other Planning Efforts

As a retail water supplier in Orange County, the City considered other key entities in the development of this WSCP, including the Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC) (regional wholesale supplier); the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MET) (regional wholesaler for Southern California and the direct supplier of imported water to MWDOC); and Orange County Water District (OCWD) (Orange County Groundwater Basin [OC Basin] manager and provider of recycled water in

North Orange County). As a MWDOC member agency, the City also developed this WSCP with input from several coordination efforts led by MWDOC.

Some of the key planning and reporting documents that were used to develop this WSCP are:

- **MWDOC's 2025 UWMP** provides the basis for the projections of the imported supply availability over the next 25 years for the City's service area.
- **MWDOC's 2025 WSCP** provides a water supply availability assessment and structured steps designed to respond to actual conditions that will help maintain reliable supplies and reduce the impacts of supply interruptions.
- **MWDOC's 2023 Orange County Water Reliability Study** is a planning document to help guide planning for future water supply reliability for water providers in Orange County and provide input on regional water supply issues for MET.
- **2025 Orange County Water Demand Projection Model Technical Memorandum** is a collaborative effort amongst MWDOC, OCWD, and all retail water suppliers in Orange County that developed water demand projections to produce regionally consistent forecasts across all Orange County water agencies.
- **OCWD's 2025 Groundwater Resilience Plan (GRP)** is an adaptive strategies management plan outlining strategic projects to secure reliable future water supplies in the Orange County Basin.
- **MET's 2025 UWMP** uses assumptions that fall within the plausible futures contemplated in MET's Integrated Water Resources Plan to evaluate MET's future imported water supply reliability.
- **MET's 2025 WSCP** provides a water supply availability assessment and guide for MET's intended actions during water shortage conditions.
- **OCWD's 2023-24 Engineer's Report** provides information on the groundwater conditions, water supply, and basin utilization of the OC Basin.
- **OCWD's 2022 Basin 8-1 Alternative** is an alternative to the Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) for the OC Basin, provides significant information related to sustainable management of the basin in the past and hydrogeology of the basin, including groundwater quality and basin characteristics, and addresses DWR's recommendations to ensure long-term basin sustainability.
- **City of Buena Park's 2025 Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP)** provides the basis for the seismic and other natural and natural disaster risk analysis of the water system facilities.

SECTION 2 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The City was incorporated in 1953 and is currently governed by a five-member City Council elected by its citizens serving four-year alternating terms. The City is located in northwest Orange County and is bounded by the cities of La Palma and Cerritos to the west, the City of La Mirada to the north, the cities of Fullerton and Anaheim to the east, and the cities of Anaheim and Cypress to the south.

2.1 City Service Area

The City's water service area includes the Buena Park city limits, excluding three areas, which are within the City limits but served by the City of Fullerton and Suburban Water Systems. In addition, the City

provides service to two locations that are outside the City limits: one area is in the City of Anaheim and the other is in the City of La Mirada. The Golden State Water Company (GSWC), formerly Southern California Water Company provides water service to the cities of Cypress and Stanton, south of the City. Suburban Water Systems provides water service to the City of La Mirada and a small segment of the City. The City recently incorporated a small area, which is within the City limits and was previously served by the GSWC.

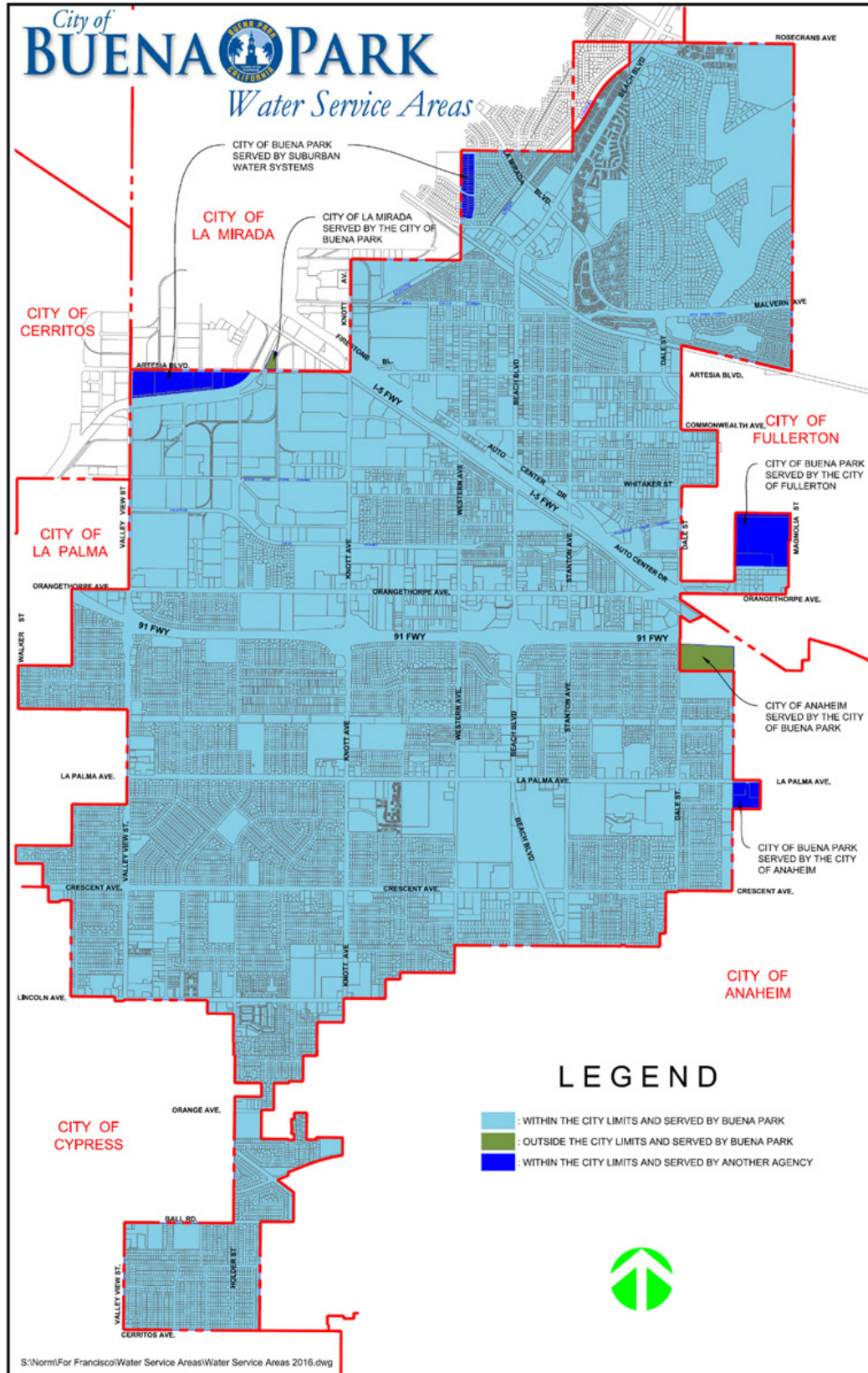


Figure 1 City Service Area

A map of the City's water service area is shown as Figure 1.

2.2 Relationship to Wholesalers

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California: MET is the largest water wholesaler for domestic and municipal uses in California, serving approximately 19 million customers. MET wholesales imported water supplies to 26 member cities and water districts in six Southern California counties. Its service area covers the Southern California coastal plain, extending approximately 200 miles along the Pacific Ocean from the City of Oxnard in the north to the international boundary with Mexico in the south. This encompasses 5,200 square miles and includes portions of Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, and Ventura counties. Approximately 85 percent of the population from the aforementioned counties reside within MET's boundaries.

MET is governed by a Board of Directors comprised of 38 appointed individuals with a minimum of one representative from each of MET's 26 member agencies. The allocation of directors and voting rights are determined by each agency's assessed valuation. Each member of the Board shall be entitled to cast one vote for each ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) of assessed valuation of property taxable for district purposes, in accordance with Section 55 of the Metropolitan Water District Act. Directors can be appointed through the chief executive officer of the member agency or by a majority vote of the governing board of the agency. Directors are not compensated by MET for their service.

MET is responsible for importing water into the region through its operation of the Colorado River Aqueduct and its contract with the State of California for SWP supplies. Member agencies receive water from MET through various delivery points and pay for service through a rate structure made up of volumetric rates, capacity charges, and readiness to serve charges. Member agencies provide estimates of imported water demand to MET annually in April regarding the amount of water they anticipate they will need to meet their demands for the next five years.

The Municipal Water District of Orange County: In Orange County, MWDOC and the cities of Anaheim, Fullerton, and Santa Ana are MET member agencies that purchase imported water directly from MET. Furthermore, MWDOC purchases both treated potable and untreated water from MET to supplement its retail agencies' local supplies.

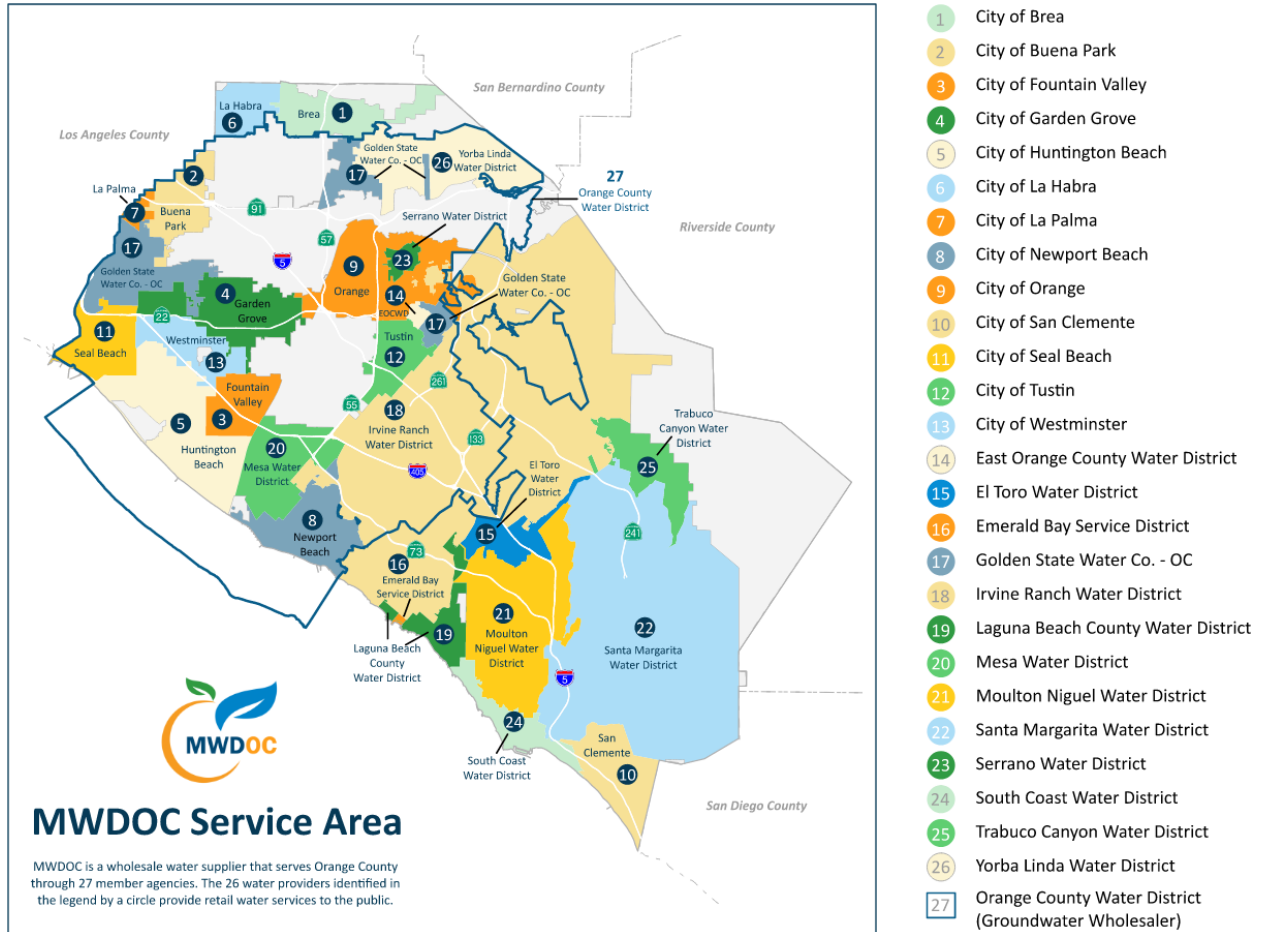


Figure 2 Regional Location of the City of Buena Park and Other MWD OC Member Agencies

The City is one of MWDOC's 27 member agencies purchasing imported water from MWDOC. The City's location within MWDOC's service area is shown in Figure 2.

2.3 Relationship With Wholesaler Water Shortage Planning

The WSCP is designed to be consistent with MET's Water Surplus and Drought Management (WSDM) Plan, MWD OC's Water Supply Allocation Plan (WSAP), and other emergency planning efforts as described below. MWD OC's WSAP is integral to the WSCP's shortage response strategy in the event that MET or MWD OC determines that supply augmentation (including storage) and lesser demand reduction measures would not be sufficient to meet a projected shortage levels needed to meet demands.

2.3.1 MET Water Surplus and Drought Management Plan

MET evaluates the level of supplies available and existing levels of water in storage to determine the appropriate management stage annually. Each stage is associated with specific resource management actions to avoid extreme shortages to the extent possible and minimize adverse impacts to retail customers should an extreme shortage occur. The sequencing outlined in the WSDM Plan reflects anticipated responses towards MET's existing and expected resource mix.

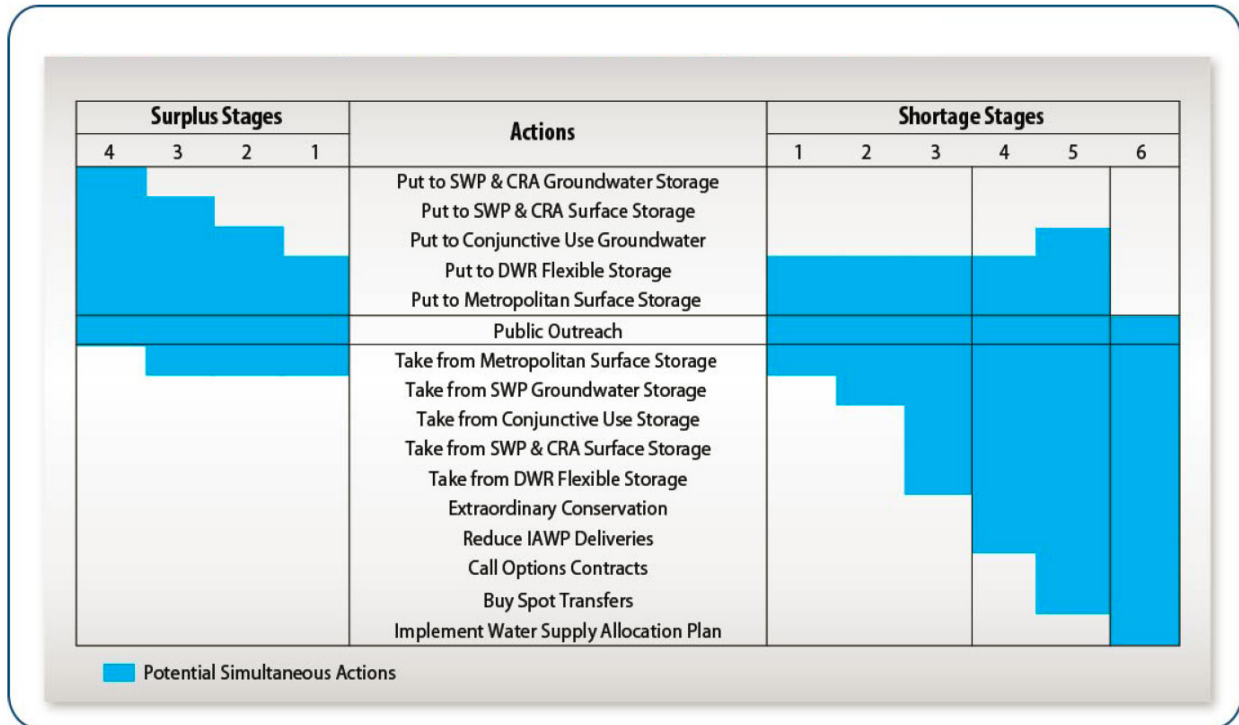
Surplus stages occur when net annual deliveries can be made to water storage programs. Under the WSDM Plan, there are four surplus management stages that provides a framework for actions to take for

surplus supplies. Deliveries in Diamond Valley Lake (DVL) and in SWP terminal reservoirs continue through each surplus stage provided there is available storage capacity. Withdrawals from DVL for regulatory purposes or to meet seasonal demands may occur in any stage.

The WSDM Plan distinguishes between shortages, severe shortages, and extreme shortages. The differences between each term are listed below:

- **Shortage:** MET can meet full-service demands and partially meet or fully meet interruptible demands using stored water or water transfers as necessary (Stages 1-3).
- **Severe Shortage:** MET can meet full-service demands only by making withdrawals from storage, calling on its water transfers, and possibly calling for extraordinary conservation and reducing deliveries under the Interim Agricultural Water Program (IAWP) (Stages 4-5).
- **Extreme Shortage:** MET must allocate available imported supplies to full-service customers (Stage 6).

There are six shortage management stages to guide resource management activities. These stages are defined by shortfalls in imported supply and water balances in MET's storage programs. When MET must make net withdrawals from storage to meet demands, it is considered to be in a shortage condition. Figure 3 gives a summary of actions under each surplus and shortage stages when an allocation plan is necessary to enforce mandatory cutbacks. The goal of the WSDM plan is to avoid Stage 6, an extreme shortage (MET, 2026b).

MET's Board of Directors adopted a Water Supply Condition Framework in June 2008 to communicate the urgency of the region's water supply situation and the need for further water conservation practices. The framework has four conditions, each calling increasing levels of conservation. Descriptions for each of the four conditions are listed below:

- **Baseline Water Use Efficiency:** Ongoing conservation, outreach, and recycling programs to achieve permanent reductions in water use and build storage reserves.
- **Condition 1 Water Supply Watch:** Local agency voluntary dry-year conservation measures and use of regional storage reserves.
- **Condition 2 Water Supply Alert:** Regional call for cities, counties, member agencies, and retail water agencies to implement extraordinary conservation through drought ordinances and other measures to mitigate use of storage reserves.
- **Condition 3 Water Supply Allocation:** Implement MET's WSAP.

As noted in Condition 3, should supplies become limited to the point where imported water demands cannot be met, MET will allocate water through the WSAP (MET, 2026a).

2.3.2 MET Water Supply Allocation Plan

MET's imported supplies have been impacted by a number of water supply challenges as noted earlier. In case of extreme water shortage within the MET service area is the implementation of its WSAP.

MET's Board of Directors adopted the WSAP in February 2008 to fairly distribute a limited amount of water supply and applies it through a detailed methodology to reflect a range of local conditions and needs of the region's retail water consumers (MET, 2026a).

The WSAP includes the specific formula for calculating member agency supply allocations and the key implementation elements needed for administering an allocation. MET's WSAP is the foundation for the urban water shortage contingency analysis required under Water Code Section 10632 and is part of MET's 2025 UWMP.

MET's WSAP was developed in consideration of the principles and guidelines in MET's 1999 WSDM Plan with the core objective of creating an equitable "needs-based allocation." The WSAP's formula seeks to balance the impacts of a shortage at the retail level while maintaining equity on the wholesale level for shortages of MET supplies of greater than 50 percent cutbacks. The formula takes into account a number of factors, such as the impact on retail customers, growth in population, changes in supply conditions, investments in local resources, demand hardening aspects of water conservation savings, recycled water, extraordinary storage and transfer actions, and groundwater imported water needs.

The formula is calculated in three steps: (1) base period calculations; (2) allocation year calculations; and (3) supply allocation calculations. The first two steps involve standard computations, while the third step contains specific methodology developed for the WSAP.

Step 1: Base Period Calculations - The first step in calculating a member agency's water supply allocation is to estimate their water supply and demand using a historical base period with established water supply and delivery data. The base period for each of the different categories of supply and demand is calculated using data from the two most recent non-shortage years.

Step 2: Allocation Year Calculations - The next step in calculating the member agency's water supply allocation is estimating water needs in the allocation year. This is done by adjusting the base period estimates of retail demand for population growth and changes in local supplies.

Step 3: Supply Allocation Calculations - The final step is calculating the water supply allocation for each member agency based on the allocation year water needs identified in Step 2.

In order to implement the WSAP, MET's Board of Directors makes a determination on the level of the regional shortage, based on specific criteria, typically in April. The criteria used by MET includes current levels of storage, estimated water supplies conditions, and projected imported water demands. The allocations, if deemed necessary, go into effect in July of the same year and remain in effect for a 12-month period. The schedule is made at the discretion of the Board of Directors (MET, 2026b).

As demonstrated by the findings in MET's 2025 UWMP, both the Water Reliability Assessment and the Drought Risk Assessment (DRA) demonstrate that MET is projecting to be able to mitigate the challenges posed by hydrologic variability, potential climate change, and regulatory risk on its imported supply sources through the significant storage capabilities it has developed over the last two decades, both dry-year and emergency storage (MET, 2026b).

Although MET's 2025 UWMP forecasts that MET will be able to meet projected imported demands throughout the projected period from 2026 to 2050, uncertainty in supply conditions can result in MET needing to implement its WSAP to preserve dry-year storage and curtail demands (MET, 2026b).

2.3.3 MWDOC Water Supply Allocation Plan

To prepare for the potential allocation of imported water supplies from MET, MWDOC worked collaboratively with its 27 retail agencies to develop its own WSAP that was adopted in January 2009 and amended in 2016. The MWDOC WSAP outlines how MWDOC will determine and implement each of its retail agency's allocation during a time of shortage.

The MWDOC WSAP uses a similar method and approach, when reasonable, as that of the MET's WSAP. However, MWDOC's plan remains flexible to use an alternative approach when MET's method produces a significant unintended result for the member agencies. The MWDOC WSAP model follows five basic steps to determine a retail agency's imported supply allocation:

Step 1: Determine Baseline Information - The first step in calculating a water supply allocation is to estimate water supply and demand using a historical base period with established water supply and delivery data. The base period for each of the different categories of demand and supply is calculated using data from the last two non-shortage years.

Step 2: Establish Allocation Year Information - In this step, the model adjusts for each retail agency's water need in the allocation year. This is done by adjusting the base period estimates for increased retail water demand based on population growth and changes in local supplies.

Step 3: Calculate Initial Minimum Allocation Based on MET's Declared Shortage Level - This step sets the initial water supply allocation for each retail agency. After a regional shortage level is established, MWDOC will calculate the initial allocation as a percentage of adjusted base period imported water needs within the model for each retail agency.

Step 4: Apply Allocation Adjustments and Credits in the Areas of Retail Impacts and Conservation -

In this step, the model assigns additional water to address disparate impacts at the retail level caused by an across-the-board cut of imported supplies. It also applies a conservation credit given to those agencies that have achieved additional water savings at the retail level as a result of successful implementation of water conservation devices, programs, and rate structures.

Step 5: Sum Total Allocations and Determine Retail Reliability - This is the final step in calculating a retail agency's total allocation for imported supplies. The model sums an agency's total imported allocation with all of the adjustments and credits and then calculates each agency's retail reliability compared to its Allocation Year Retail Demand.

The MWDOC WSAP includes additional measures for plan implementation, including the following (MWDOC, 2016):

- **Appeal Process** - An appeal process to provide retail agencies the opportunity to request a change to their allocation based on new or corrected information. MWDOC anticipates that under most circumstances, a retail agency's appeal will be the basis for an appeal to MET by MWDOC.
- **Melded Allocation Surcharge Structure** - At the end of the allocation year, MWDOC would only charge an allocation surcharge to each retail agency that exceeded their allocation if MWDOC exceeds its total allocation and is required to pay a surcharge to MET. MET enforces allocations to retail agencies through an allocation surcharge to a retail agency that exceeds its total annual allocation at the end of the 12-month allocation period. MWDOC's surcharge would be assessed according to the retail agency's prorated share (acre-feet [AF] over usage) of MWDOC amount with MET. Surcharge funds collected by MET will be invested in its Water Management Fund, which is used in part to fund expenditures in dry-year conservation and local resource development.
- **Tracking and Reporting Water Usage** - MWDOC will provide each retail agency with water use monthly reports that will compare each retail agency's current cumulative retail usage to their allocation baseline. MWDOC will also provide quarterly reports on its cumulative retail usage versus its allocation baseline.
- **Timeline and Option to Revisit the Plan** - The allocation period will cover 12 consecutive months and the Regional Shortage Level will be set for the entire allocation period. MWDOC only anticipates calling for allocation when MET declares a shortage; and no later than 30 days from MET's declaration will MWDOC announce allocation to its retail agencies.

SECTION 3 WATER SHORTAGE CONTINGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE PLANNING

The City's WSCP is a detailed guide of how the City intends to act in the case of an actual water shortage condition. The WSCP anticipates a water supply shortage and provides pre-planned guidance for managing and mitigating a shortage. Regardless of the reason for the shortage, the WSCP is based on adequate details of demand reduction and supply augmentation measures that are structured to match varying degrees of shortage to ensure the relevant stakeholders understand what to expect during a water shortage situation.

3.1 Water Supply Reliability Analysis

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(1), the WSCP shall provide an analysis of water supply reliability conducted pursuant to Water Code Section 10635, and the key issues that may create a shortage condition when looking at the City's water asset portfolio.

Understanding water supply reliability, factors that could contribute to water supply constraints, availability of alternative supplies, and what effect these have on meeting customer demands provides the City with a solid basis on which to develop appropriate and feasible response actions in the event of a water shortage. For the 2025 UWMP, the City worked collaboratively with MWDOC, OCWD, and MWDOC's other retail water agencies to produce long-term projected water use over the next 25 years, in 5-year increments, for each agency (MWDOC, 2025).

The City also conducted a DRA to evaluate a drought period that lasts five consecutive water years starting from the year following when the assessment is conducted (2026-2030). An analysis of both assessments determined that the City is capable of meeting all customers' demands from 2025 through 2050 for a normal year, a single dry year, and a drought lasting 5 consecutive years with significant imported water supplemental drought supplies from MWDOC/MET and ongoing conservation program efforts. The City has also added reliability through receiving the majority of its water supply from groundwater from the OC Basin and supplemental supplies from MWDOC/MET. As a result, there is no projected shortage condition due to drought that will trigger customer demand reduction actions until MWDOC notifies the City of insufficient imported supplies. More information is available in the City's 2025 UWMP Sections 6 and 7 (Buena Park, 2026).

3.2 Annual Water Supply and Demand Assessment Procedures

Per Water Code Section 10632.1, the City will conduct an AWSDA pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 10632 and by July 1 of each year, beginning in 2022, submit an AWSDA with information for anticipated shortage, triggered shortage response actions, compliance and enforcement actions, and communication actions consistent with the Supplier's WSCP.

The City must include in its WSCP the procedures used for conducting an AWSDA. The AWSDA is a determination of the near-term outlook for supplies and demands and how a perceived shortage may relate to WSCP shortage level response actions in the current calendar year. This determination is based on information available to the City at the time of the analysis. Starting in 2022, the AWSDA is due by July 1 of every year.

This section documents the decision-making process required for formal approval of the City's AWSDA determination of water supply reliability each year, the key data inputs, and the methodologies used to evaluate the water system reliability for the coming year, while considering that the year to follow would be considered dry.

3.2.1 Decision-Making Process

The following decision-making process describes the functional steps that the City will take to formally approve the AWSDA determination of water supply reliability each year.

3.2.1.1 City Steps to Approve the AWSDA Determination

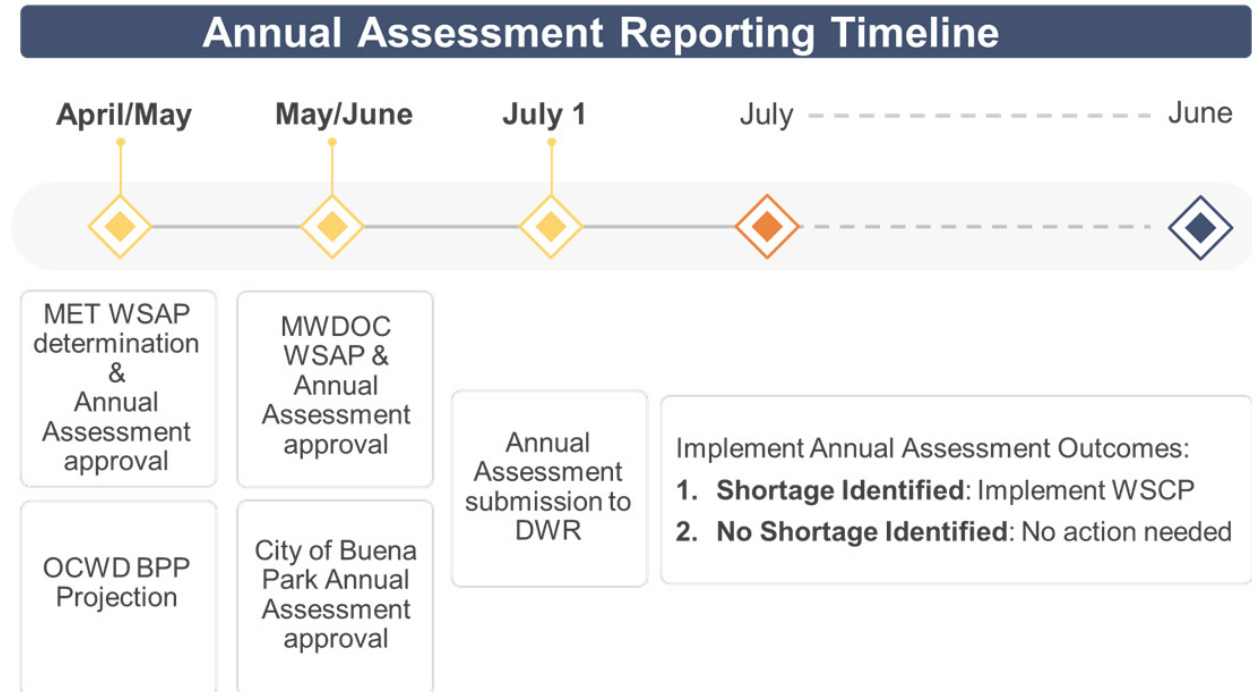


Figure 4 AWSDA Reporting Timeline

The AWSDA will be predicated on the OCWD Basin Production Percentage (BPP) and on MWDOK's AWSDA outcomes. Figure 4 shows the AWSDA reporting timeline for the City of Buena Park.

The City produces local groundwater from the OC Basin managed by OCWD. The OC Basin is not adjudicated and as such, pumping from the OC Basin is managed through a process that uses financial incentives to encourage Groundwater Producers (Producers) to pump a sustainable amount of water. The framework for the financial incentives is based on establishing the BPP, the percentage of each Producer's total water supply that comes from groundwater pumped from the OC Basin. The BPP is set uniformly for all Producers by the OCWD Board of Directors on an annual basis. Based on the projected water demand and modeled water supply, over the long-term, OCWD anticipates sustainably supporting a BPP of 85 percent; however, volumes of groundwater and imported water may vary depending on OCWD's actual BPP projections. A supply reduction that may result from the annual BPP projection will be included in the AWSDA.

While the City's primary source of water is OCWD groundwater, any remaining source to meet retail demands comes from the purchase of imported water from MWDOK. MWDOK surveys its member agencies annually for anticipated water demands and supplies for the upcoming year. MWDOK utilizes this information to plan for the anticipated imported water supplies for the MWDOK service area. This information is then shared and coordinated with MET and is incorporated into their analysis of their

service area's annual imported water needs. Based on the year's supply conditions and WSDM actions, MET will present a completed AWSDA for its member agencies' review from which they will then seek Board approval in April of each year. Additionally, MET expects that any triggers or specific shortage response actions that result from the AWSDA will be approved by their Board at that time. Based upon MET's Assessment and taking into consideration information provided to MWDOC through the annual survey, MWDOC will provide an anticipated estimate of imported supplies for the City to incorporate into the AWSDA.

The City Water Department designee will be responsible for approving the AWSDA in years when no shortage is identified and submitting it to DWR by July 1. In years where a water shortage is identified, the AWSDA will be presented to City Council and submitted to DWR prior to the July 1 deadline.

3.2.2 Data and Methodologies

The following paragraphs document the key data inputs and methodologies that are used to evaluate the water system reliability for the coming year, while considering that the year to follow would be considered dry.

3.2.2.1 Assessment Methodology

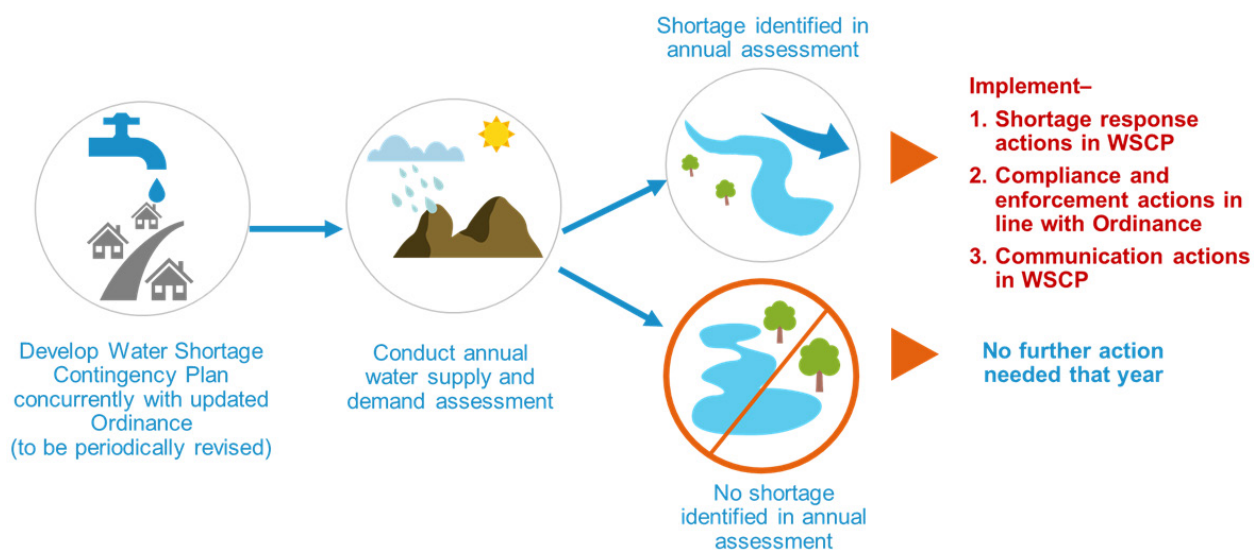


Figure 5 Water Shortage Contingency Plan AWSDA Framework

The City will evaluate water supply reliability for the current year and one dry year for the purpose of the AWSDA. The AWSDA determination will be based on considerations of unconstrained water demand, local water supplies, MWDOC imported water supplies, planned water use, and infrastructure considerations. The balance between projected in-service area supplies, coupled with MWDOC imported supplies, and anticipated unconstrained demand will be used to determine what, if any, shortage level is expected under the WSCP framework as presented in Figure 5. The WSCP's standard shortage levels are defined in terms of shortage percentages. Shortage percentages will be calculated by dividing the difference between water supplies and unconstrained demand by total unconstrained demand. This calculation will be performed separately for anticipated current year conditions and for assumed dry year conditions.

3.2.2.2 Locally Applicable Evaluation Criteria

Within Orange County, there are no significant local applicable criteria that directly affect reliability. Through the years, the water agencies in Orange County have made tremendous efforts to integrate their systems to provide flexibility to interchange with different sources of supplies. There are emergency agreements in place to ensure all parts of the County have an adequate supply of water. In the northern part of the County, agencies have the ability to meet a majority of their demands through groundwater with very little limitation, except for the OCWD BPP.

The City will also continue to monitor emerging supply and demand conditions related to supplemental imported water from MWDOC/MET and take appropriate actions consistent with the flexibility and adaptiveness inherent to the WSCP. The City's AWSDA was based on the City's service area, water sources, water supply reliability, and water use as described in Water Code Section 10631, including available data from state, regional, or local agency population, land use development, and climate change projections within the service area of the City. Some conditions that affect MWDOC's wholesale supply and demand, such as groundwater replenishment, surface water, and local supply production, can differ significantly from earlier projections throughout the year.

If a major earthquake on the San Andreas Fault occurs, it has the potential to damage all three key regional water aqueducts and disrupt imported supplies for up to six months. The region would likely impose a water use reduction ranging from 25 to 35 percent until the system is repaired. However, MET has taken proactive steps to handle such disruption, such as constructing DVL, and prepositioning necessary reconstruction resources to quickly recover from such a seismic event, which mitigates potential impacts. DVL, along with other local reservoirs, can store a six to twelve-month supply of emergency water (MET, 2026a).

3.2.2.3 Water Supply

As detailed in the City's 2025 UWMP, the City meets its customers' demands with a combination of local groundwater from the OC Basin and imported water from MWDOC/MET. The City's main source of water supply is groundwater, with imported water making up the rest of the City's water supply portfolio. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25, the City relied on approximately 91 percent groundwater and 9 percent imported water. It is projected that by 2050, the water supply portfolio will change to approximately 85 percent groundwater (consistent with OCWD's long-term 85 percent BPP projection) and 15 percent imported water, and the City can purchase more MET imported water through MWDOC should the need arise (Buena Park, 2026).

3.2.2.4 Unconstrained Customer Demand

The WSCP and AWSDA define unconstrained demand as expected water use prior to any projected shortage response actions that may be taken under the WSCP. Unconstrained demand is distinguished from observed demand, which may be constrained by preceding, ongoing, or future actions, such as emergency supply allocations during a multi-year drought. WSCP shortage response actions to constrain demand are inherently extraordinary; routine activities such as ongoing conservation programs and regular operational adjustments are not considered as constraints on demands.

The City's DRA reveals that its supply capabilities are expected to balance anticipated total water use and supply, assuming a 5-year consecutive drought from FY 2025-26 through FY 2029-30 (Buena Park, 2026).

This is based on the water demand projection model, in a single dry year, demand is expected to increase by 7 percent above a normal year (MWDOC, 2025).

For the City, the five consecutive dry year demand scenario is based on the demand model's multiple dry year methodology. In accordance with the econometric demand model approach used to develop UWMP demand projections, a single hot/dry year was first identified based on weather conditions that produced the greatest demand response. Consecutive dry years were then represented by applying incremental scaling factors to this single hot/dry year demand to account for the compounding effects of persistent warm and dry conditions over time. These scaling factors show long-term relationships between regional water use and multi-year temperature and precipitation deficits and are applied sequentially to simulate second through fifth consecutive dry years. This approach is consistent with the demand modeling framework summarized in Chapter 7 of the City's UWMP.

3.2.2.5 Planned Water Use for Current Year Considering Dry Subsequent Year

Water Code Section 10632(a)(2)(B)(ii) requires the AWSDA to determine "current year available supply, considering hydrological and regulatory conditions in the current year and one dry year."

The AWSDA will include two separate estimates of City's annual water supply and unconstrained demand using: (1) current year conditions; and (2) assumed dry year conditions. Accordingly, the AWSDA's shortage analysis will present separate sets of findings for the current year and dry year scenarios. The Water Code does not specify the characteristics of a dry year, allowing discretion to the Supplier. The City will use its discretion to refine and update its assumptions for a dry year scenarios in each AWSDA as information becomes available and in accordance with best management practices.

Supply and demand analyses for the single-dry year case were based on conditions affecting the SWP as this supply availability fluctuates the most among MET's, and therefore MWDOC and the City's, sources of supply. Severe drought conditions in 2021-2022 affected much of the Western United States, including the Colorado River system, which caused its water supply decrease. As conditions worsened, Lake Mead and Lake Powell (the largest storage units in the system), had a combined total storage capacity of 25 percent in 2022, a significant decrease from 39 percent in 2021 (MWDOC, 2025).

The Orange County Water Demand Projection Model isolated the impacts that weather and future climate can have on water demand through the use of a statistical model. The impacts of hot/dry weather conditions are reflected as a percentage increase in water demands from the normal year condition. For a single dry year condition (FY 2013-14), the model projects a 5 percent increase in demand for the OC Basin area where the City's service area is located (MWDOC, 2025). Detailed information of the model is included in the City's 2025 UWMP.

The City has documented that it is 100 percent reliable for single dry year demands from 2025 through 2050 with a demand increase of 7 percent from normal demand with significant reserves held by MET, local groundwater supplies, and conservation (Buena Park, 2026).

3.2.2.6 Infrastructure Considerations

The AWSDA will include consideration of any infrastructure issues that may pertain to near-term water supply reliability, including repairs, construction, and environmental mitigation measures that may temporarily constrain capabilities, as well as any new projects that may add to system capacity. MWDOC closely coordinates with MET and its member agencies, including the City, on any planned infrastructure

work that may impact water supply availability. Throughout each year, MET regularly carries out preventive and corrective maintenance of its facilities within the MWDOC service area that may require shutdowns to inspect and repair pipelines and facilities and support capital improvement projects. These shutdowns involve a high level of planning and coordination between MWDOC, MWDOC's member agencies, and MET to ensure that major portions of the distribution system are not out of service at the same time. Operational flexibility within MET's system and the cooperation of member agencies allow shutdowns to be successfully completed while continuing to meet all system demands.

Specifically for the City, as of March 2026 there are no foreseen near-term infrastructure issues that would impact supply.

3.2.2.7 Other Factors

For the AWSDA, any known issues related to water quality would be considered for their potential effects on water supply reliability.

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a group of thousands of manmade chemicals that includes perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS). PFAS compounds were once commonly used in many products including, among many others, stain- and water-repellent fabrics, nonstick products (e.g., Teflon), polishes, waxes, paints, cleaning products, and fire-fighting foams. Beginning in the summer of 2019, the California State Division of Drinking Water (DDW) began requiring testing for PFAS compounds in some groundwater production wells in the OCWD area.

MET has voluntarily monitored PFAS in its source and treated waters since 2017. Most samples have shown non detect (ND) for all tested PFAS, including PFOA and PFOS. A limited number of other PFAS—such as PFHxA, PFBA, PFPeA, PFDoA, PFTA, and PFBS, have been detected only at trace levels below their method detection limits. PFOA and PFOS have not been detected in MET's imported or treated water supplies. Some member agencies, however, have detected these compounds in local groundwater wells, which may require treatment or source management to comply with emerging DDW regulations. As DDW and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) establish enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for PFOA and PFOS, some agencies may supplement their local supplies with increased purchases of MET water (MET, 2025).

EPA finalized the first national drinking water standards for six PFAS compounds in April 2024. These standards include enforceable MCLs for PFOA and PFOS set at 4 parts per trillion (ppt). In May 2025 the EPA announced that it would extend the compliance deadline for PFOA and PFOS from 2029 to 2031 to provide additional time for testing, planning, and installation of treatment technologies. While MET and its member agencies continue to monitor and test PFAS in imported and local sources, the delay in the federal compliance date allows additional time to evaluate treatment options, coordinate funding, and plan system upgrades necessary to meet forthcoming federal PFAS standards.

PFAS have been detected in the OC Basin in very small amounts (parts per trillion), entering primarily via the Santa Ana River whose flows infiltrate into the basin. Despite playing no role in releasing PFAS into the environment, OCWD is working with its cities and retail water districts to remove it from local water supplies in order to comply with new state and federal regulations. More than 100 wells have been impacted due to various state and federal regulations. Fifteen impacted agencies will have to temporarily purchase more costly imported water to replace PFAS contaminated supplies. As of 2025, 53 impacted wells are back online due to close to a billion dollars being spent on state-of-the-art testing, research and

piloting of different treatment systems, and design and construction of treatment plants that are now operational.

3.3 Six Standard Water Shortage Levels

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(3)(A), Suppliers must include the six standard water shortage levels that represent shortages from the normal reliability as determined in the AWSDA or cross-reference their shortage levels to the standard levels. The shortage levels have been standardized to provide a consistent regional and statewide approach to conveying the relative severity of water supply shortage conditions. This is an outgrowth of the severe statewide drought of 2012-2016, and the widely recognized public communication and state policy uncertainty associated with the many different local definitions of water shortage levels.

The six standard water shortage levels correspond to progressively increasing estimated shortage conditions (up to 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, and greater than 50 percent shortage compared to the normal reliability condition) and align with the response actions the Supplier would implement to meet the severity of the impending shortages (Table 1).

3.4 Shortage Response Actions

Water Code Section 10632 (a)(4) requires the WSCP to specify shortage response actions that align with the defined shortage levels. The City has defined specific shortage response actions that align with the defined shortage levels in DWR Tables 8-2 and 8-3 (Appendix A). These shortage response actions were developed with consideration to the system infrastructure and operations changes, supply augmentation responses, customer-class or water use-specific demand reduction initiatives, and increasingly stringent water use prohibitions.

3.4.1 Supply Augmentation

The supply augmentation actions are described in DWR Table 8-2 (Appendix A). These augmentations represent short-term management objectives triggered by the MET's WSDM Plan and do not overlap with the long-term new water supply development or supply reliability enhancement projects. Supply Augmentation is made available to the City through MWDOC and MET. The City relies on MET's reliability portfolio of water supply programs including existing water transfers, storage, and exchange agreements to supplement gaps in the City's supply/demand balance. MET has developed significant storage capacity (over 5 million AF) in reservoirs and groundwater banking programs both within and outside of the Southern California region. Additionally, MET can pursue additional water transfer and exchange programs with other water agencies to help mitigate supply/demand imbalances and provide additional dry-year supply sources.

MWDOC, and in turn its retail agencies, including the City, have access to supply augmentation actions through MET. MET may exercise these actions based on regional need, and in accordance with their WSCP, and may include the use of supplies and storage programs within the Colorado River, SWP, and in-region storage. The City has the ability to augment its supply to reduce the shortage gap by up to 100 percent by purchasing additional imported water through MWDOC or pumping additional groundwater in the OC Basin; however, both are subject to rate penalties from MWDOC and OCWD, respectively.

3.4.2 Demand Reduction

The demand reduction measures that would be implemented to address shortage levels are described in DWR Table 8-3 (Appendix A). This table indicates which actions align with specific defined shortage levels and estimates the extent to which the actions will reduce the gap between supplies and demands to deliver the outcomes necessary to meet the requirements of a given shortage level. This table also identifies the enforcement action, if any, associated with each demand reduction measure.

3.4.3 Operational Changes

During shortage conditions, operations may be affected by supply augmentation or demand reduction responses. The City will consider their operational procedures when it completes its AWSDA or as needed to identify changes that can be implemented to address water shortage on a short-term basis, such as temporarily altering maintenance cycles, deferring planned system outages, and adjusting the flow and routing of water through its system to more effectively distribute available supply across the service area.

3.4.4 Additional Mandatory Restrictions

Water Code Section 10632(a)(4)(D) calls for "additional, mandatory prohibitions against specific water use practices that are in addition to state-mandated prohibitions and appropriate to the local conditions" to be included among the WSCP's shortage response actions. The City will identify additional mandatory restrictions as needed based on the Buena Park Municipal Code Chapter 13.28 Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program (Appendix B). The City intends to update any mandatory restrictions in a subsequently adopted ordinance which will supersede the existing ordinance.

3.4.5 Emergency Response Plan (Hazard Mitigation Plan)

A catastrophic water shortage would be addressed according to the appropriate water shortage level and response actions. It is likely that a catastrophic shortage would immediately trigger Shortage Level 6 and response actions have been put in place to mitigate a catastrophic shortage. In addition, there are several Plans that address catastrophic failures and align with the WSCP, including MET's WSDM and WSAP, the City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP), and the Water Emergency Response Organization of Orange County's (WERO) Emergency Operations Plan (EOP).

3.4.5.1 MET's WSDM and WSAP

MET has comprehensive plans for stages of actions it would undertake to address a catastrophic interruption in water supplies through its WSDM and WSAP. MET also developed an Emergency Storage Requirement to mitigate against potential interruption in water supplies resulting from catastrophic occurrences within the Southern California region, including seismic events along the San Andreas Fault. In addition, MET is working with the state to implement a comprehensive improvement plan to address catastrophic occurrences outside of the Southern California region, such as a maximum probable seismic event in the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta that would cause levee failure and disruption of SWP deliveries.

3.4.5.2 Water Emergency Response Organization of Orange County Emergency Operations Plan

In 1983, the Orange County water community identified a need to develop a plan on how agencies would respond effectively to disasters impacting the regional water distribution system. The collective efforts of these agencies resulted in the formation of WERO to coordinate emergency response on behalf of all Orange County water and wastewater agencies, develop an emergency plan to respond to disasters, and conduct disaster training exercises for the Orange County water community. WERO, administered by MWDOC, was established through the creation of an indemnification agreement among its member agencies to protect each other against civil liabilities and to facilitate the exchange of resources. WERO is unique in its ability to provide a single point of contact for the representation of all water and wastewater utilities in Orange County during a disaster. This representation is to the county, state, and federal disaster coordination agencies. Within the Orange County Operational Area, WERO is the recognized contact for emergency response for the water community, including the City.

As a member of WERO, the City will follow WERO's EOP in the event of an emergency and coordinate with WERO to assess damage, initiate repairs, and request and coordinate mutual aid resources in the event that the City is unable to provide the level of emergency response support required by the situation.

The EOP defines the actions to be taken by WERO Emergency Operations Center (EOC) staff to reduce the loss of water and wastewater infrastructure; to respond effectively to a disaster; and to coordinate recovery operations in the aftermath of any emergency involving extensive damage to Orange County water and wastewater utilities. The EOP includes activation notification protocol that will be used to contact partner agencies to inform them of the situation, activation status of the EOC, known damage or impacts, or resource needs. The EOP is a standalone document that is reviewed annually and approved by the MWDOC Board every three years.

WEROC is organized on the basis that each member agency is responsible for developing its own EOP in accordance with the California Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), National Incident Management System (NIMS), and Public Health Security and Bioterrorism Preparedness and Response Act of 2002 to meet specific emergency needs within its service area.

The WEROC EOC is responsible for assessing the overall condition and status of the Orange County regional water distribution and wastewater collection systems including MET facilities that serve Orange County. The EOC can be activated during an emergency situation resulting from both natural and man-made causes, and can be activated through automatic, manual, or standby for activation.

WEROC recognizes four primary phases of emergency management, which include:

- **Preparedness:** Planning, training, and exercises that are conducted prior to an emergency to support and enhance response to an emergency or disaster.
- **Response:** Activities and programs designed to address the immediate and short-term effects of the onset of an emergency or disaster that helps to reduce effects on water infrastructure and speed recovery. This includes alert and notification, EOC activation, direction and control, and mutual aid.
- **Recovery:** This phase involved restoring systems to normal, in which short-term recovery actions are taken to assess the damage and return vital life-support systems to minimum operating standards, while long-term recovery actions have the potential to continue for many years.
- **Mitigation/Prevention:** These actions prevent the occurrence of an emergency or reduce the area's vulnerability in ways that minimize the adverse impacts of a disaster or emergency.

The EOC Action Plans provide frameworks for EOC staff to respond to different situations with the objectives and steps required to complete them, which will in turn serve the WEROC member agencies. In the event of an emergency that results in a catastrophic water shortage, the City will declare a water shortage condition of up to Level 3 for the impacted area depending on the severity of the event, and coordination with WEROC is anticipated to begin at Level 4 or greater (WEROC, 2021).

3.4.5.3 City of Buena Park Emergency Response Plan

The City will also refer to its current American Water Infrastructure Act Risk and Resilience Assessment and Emergency Response Plan in the event of a catastrophic supply interruption.

3.4.6 Seismic Risk Assessment and Mitigation Plan

Per the Water Code Section 10632.5, Suppliers are required to assess seismic risk to water supplies as part of their WSCP. The plan also must include the mitigation plan for the seismic risk(s). Given the great distances that imported supplies travel to reach Orange County, the region is vulnerable to interruptions along hundreds of miles of aqueducts, pipelines and other facilities associated with delivering the supplies to the region. Additionally, the infrastructure in place to deliver supplies is susceptible to damage from earthquakes and other disasters.

In lieu of conducting a seismic risk assessment specific to the City's 2025 UWMP, the City has included their LHMP, as required under the federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (Public Law 106-390). The LHMP describes the City's approach to proactively decreasing threats before disaster occurs, including water supply specific mitigation actions such as improving security and alert systems, upgrading back-up power systems, and retrofitting existing flood control infrastructure. (Buena Park, 2025).

3.4.7 Shortage Response Action Effectiveness

For each specific Shortage Response Action identified in the plan, the WSCP also estimates the extent to which that action will reduce the gap between supplies and demands identified in DWR Tables 8-2 and 8-3 (Appendix A). To the extent feasible, City has estimated percentage savings for the chosen suite of shortage response actions, which can be anticipated to deliver the expected outcomes necessary to meet the requirements of a given shortage level.

3.5 Communication Protocols

Timely and effective communication is a key element of the WSCP implementation. Per the Water Code Section 10632 (a)(5), the City has established communication protocols and procedures to inform customers, the public, interested parties, and local, regional, and state governments regarding any current or predicted shortages as determined by the AWSDA described pursuant to Section 10632.1; any shortage response actions triggered or anticipated to be triggered by the AWSDA described pursuant to Section 10632.1; and any other relevant communications. The City's Water Shortage Communication Plan is documented in Appendix C.

3.6 Compliance and Enforcement

Per the Water Code Section 10632 (a)(6), the City has defined customer compliance, enforcement, appeal, and exemption procedures for triggered shortage response actions. Communication procedures to ensure customer compliance are described in Section 3.5 Communication Protocols and customer enforcement, appeal, and exemption procedures are defined in the Buena Park Municipal Code Chapter 13.28 Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program (Appendix B).

3.7 Legal Authorities

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(7)(A), the City has provided a description of the legal authorities that empower the City to implement and enforce its shortage response in the Buena Park Municipal Code Chapter 13.28 Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program (Appendix B). The City intends to update any legal authorities in a subsequently adopted ordinance which will supersede the existing ordinance.

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(7) (B), the City shall declare a water shortage emergency condition to prevail within the area served by such wholesaler whenever it finds and determines that the ordinary demands and requirements of water consumers cannot be satisfied without depleting the water supply of the distributor to the extent that there would be insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation, and fire protection.

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(7)(C), the City shall coordinate with any agency or county within which it provides water supply services for the possible proclamation of a local emergency under California Government Code, California Emergency Services Act (Article 2, Section 8558). Table 2 identifies the contacts for all cities or counties for which the Supplier provides service in the WSCP, along with developed coordination protocols, can facilitate compliance with this section of the Water Code in the event of a local emergency as defined in subpart (c) of Government Code Section 8558.

3.8 Financial Consequences of WSCP

Per Water Code Section 10632(a)(8), Suppliers must include a description of the overall anticipated financial consequences to the Supplier of implementing the WSCP. This description must include potential reductions in revenue and increased expenses associated with implementation of the shortage response actions. This should be coupled with an identification of the anticipated mitigation actions needed to address these financial impacts.

During a catastrophic interruption of water supplies, prolonged drought, or water shortage of any kind, the City will experience a reduction in revenue due to reduced water sales. Throughout this period of time, expenditures may increase or decrease with varying circumstances. Expenditures may increase in the event of significant damage to the water system, resulting in emergency repairs. Expenditures may also decrease as less water is pumped through the system, resulting in lower power costs. Water shortage mitigation actions will also impact revenues and require additional costs for drought response activities such as increased staff costs for tracking, reporting, and communications.

The City receives water revenue from a service charge and a commodity charge based on consumption. The service charge recovers costs associated with providing water to the serviced property. The service charge does not vary with consumption and the commodity charge is based on water usage. Rates have been designed to recover the full cost of water service in the charges. Therefore, the total cost of purchasing water would decrease as the usage or sale of water decreases. In the event of a drought emergency, the City will impose excessive water use penalties on its customers, which may include additional costs associated with reduced water revenue, staff time taken for penalty enforcement, and advertising the excessive use penalties. The excessive water use penalties are further described in the Buena Park Municipal Code Chapter 13.28 Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program (Appendix B).

However, there are significant fixed costs associated with maintaining a minimal level of service. The City will monitor projected revenues and expenditures should an extreme shortage and a large reduction in water sales occur for an extended period of time. To overcome these potential revenue losses and/or expenditure impacts, the City may use reserves. If necessary, the City may reduce expenditures by delaying implementation of its Capital Improvement Program and equipment purchases to reallocate funds to cover the cost of operations and critical maintenance, adjust the work force, implement a drought surcharge, and/or make adjustments to its water rate structure.

Based on current water rates, a volumetric cutback of 50 percent and above of water sales may lead to a range of reductions in revenues. The impacts to revenues will depend on a proportionate reduction in variable costs related to supply, pumping, and treatment for the specific shortage event. The City has set aside reserve funding to mitigate a short-term water shortage situation.

3.9 Monitoring and Reporting

Per Water Code Section 10632(a)(9), the City is required to provide a description of the monitoring and reporting requirements and procedures that have been implemented to ensure appropriate data is collected, tracked, and analyzed for purposes of monitoring customer compliance and to meet state reporting requirements.

Monitoring and reporting key water use metrics is fundamental to water supply planning and management. Monitoring is also essential in times of water shortage to ensure that the response actions are achieving their intended water use reduction purposes, or if improvements or new actions need to be considered (see Section 3.10). Monitoring for customer compliance tracking is also useful in enforcement actions.

Under normal water supply conditions, potable water production figures are recorded daily. Weekly and monthly reports are prepared and monitored. This data will be used to measure the effectiveness of any water shortage contingency level that may be implemented. As levels of water shortage are declared by MET and MWDOC, the City will follow implementation of those levels as appropriate based on the City's risk profile provided in UWMP Chapter 6 and continue to monitor water demand levels. When MET calls for extraordinary conservation, MET's Drought Program Officer will coordinate public information activities with MWDOC and monitor the effectiveness of ongoing conservation programs.

The City will participate in monthly member agency manager meetings with both MWDOC and OCWD to monitor and discuss monthly water allocation charts. This will enable the City to be aware of import and groundwater use on a timely basis as a result of specific actions taken responding to the City's WSCP.

3.10 WSCP Refinement Procedures

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(10), the City must provide reevaluation and improvement procedures for systematically monitoring and evaluating the functionality of the water shortage contingency plan in order to ensure shortage risk tolerance is adequate and appropriate water shortage mitigation strategies are implemented as needed.

The City's WSCP is prepared and implemented as an adaptive management plan. The City will use the monitoring and reporting process defined in Section 3.9 to refine the WSCP. In addition, if certain procedural refinements or new actions are identified by City staff, or suggested by customers or other interested parties, the City will evaluate their effectiveness, incorporate them into the WSCP, and implement them quickly at the appropriate water shortage level.

It is envisioned that the WSCP will be periodically re-evaluated to ensure that its shortage risk tolerance is adequate and the shortage response actions are effective and up to date based on lessons learned from implementing the WSCP. The WSCP will be revised and updated during the UWMP update cycle to incorporate updated and new information. For example, new supply augmentation actions will be added, and actions that are no longer applicable for reasons such as program expiration will be removed. However, if revisions to the WSCP are warranted before the UWMP is updated, the WSCP will be updated outside of the UWMP update cycle. In the course of preparing the AWSDA each year, City staff will routinely consider the functionality of the overall WSCP and will prepare recommendations for the City Council if changes are found to be needed.

3.11 Special Water Feature Distinction

Per Water Code Section 10632 (b), the City has defined water features in that are artificially supplied with water, including ponds, lakes, waterfalls, and fountains, separately from swimming pools and spas, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 115921 of the Health and Safety Code, in the Buena Park Municipal Code Chapter 13.28 Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program (Appendix B).

3.12 Plan Adoption, Submittal, and Availability

Per Water Code Section 10632 (a)(c), the City provided notice of the availability of the Public Review Draft 2025 UWMP and 2025 WSCP and notice of the public hearing to consider adoption of the WSCP. The Public Review Drafts of the 2025 UWMP and the 2025 WSCP were posted prominently on the City's [website](#) in advance of the public hearing on May 12, 2026. Copies of the Draft WSCP were also made available for public inspection at the City Clerk's and Utilities Department offices and public hearing notifications were published in local newspapers. A copy of the published Notice of Public Hearing is included in Appendix D.

The City held the public hearing for the Draft 2025 UWMP and Draft WSCP on May 12, 2026, at the City Council meeting. The City Council reviewed and approved the 2025 UWMP and the WSCP at its June 11, 2026 meeting after the public hearing. See Appendix E for the resolution approving the WSCP.

By July 1, 2026, the City's adopted 2025 UWMP and WSCP was filed with DWR, California State Library, and the County of Orange. The City will make the WSCP available for public review on its website no later than 30 days after filing with DWR.

Based on DWR's review of the WSCP, the City will make any amendments to its adopted WSCP, as required and directed by DWR.

If the City revises its WSCP after the UWMP is approved by DWR, then an electronic copy of the revised WSCP will be submitted to DWR within 30 days of its adoption.

WHEREAS, Sections 10610 through 10657 of the California Water Code, known as the Urban Water Management Planning Act, require that every urban water supplier providing water for municipal purposes either directly or indirectly to more than 3,000 customers or supplying more than 3,000 acre-feet of water annually, prepare an Urban Water Management Plan ("UWMP") at least once every five years; and

WHEREAS, these plans support suppliers' long-term resource planning to ensure that adequate water supplies are available to meet existing and future water needs; and

WHEREAS, each UWMP must be adopted by the supplier's governing body and submitted to the California Department of Water Resources; and

WHEREAS, the City of Buena Park is an urban water supplier subject to this requirement; and

WHEREAS, on June 22, 2021, by Resolution No. 14349, the City Council adopted the City's 2020 UWMP; and

WHEREAS, the City has prepared the 2025 Urban Water Management Plan as an update to the 2020 UWMP on the City's water resource needs, water use efficiency programs, water reliability assessments, and strategies to mitigate water shortage conditions; and

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

WHEREAS, Sections 10610 through 10657 of the California Water Code, known as the Urban Water Management Planning Act, require that every urban water supplier providing water for municipal purposes either directly or indirectly to more than 3,000 customers or supplying more than 3,000 acre-feet of water annually, prepare an Urban Water Management Plan ("UWMP") at least once every five years; and

WHEREAS, these plans support suppliers' long-term resource planning to ensure that adequate water supplies are available to meet existing and future water needs; and

WHEREAS, each UWMP must be adopted by the supplier's governing body and submitted to the California Department of Water Resources; and

WHEREAS, the City of Buena Park is an urban water supplier subject to this requirement;
and

WHEREAS, on June 22, 2021, by Resolution No. 14,350 the City Council adopted the City's 2020 Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP); and

WHEREAS, the City has prepared the 2025 WSCP as an update to the 2020 WSCP on the City's strategies to mitigate water shortage conditions; and

WHEREAS, the City's 2025 UWMP contains all elements to satisfy compliance with the Urban Water Management Planning Act as amended since 2020; and

WHEREAS, the City's 2025 UWMP contains a WSCP, a detailed proposal for how a supplier intends to act in the case of an actual water shortage condition, as required by Water Code Section 10632; and

WHEREAS, the WSCP must be treated as a standalone plan for public hearing and adoption procedures; and

WHEREAS, the City has given the legally required notices for the 2025 WSCP and conducted a public hearing on June 9, 2026 to consider the approval of the 2025 WSCP; and

WHEREAS, the City gave the legally required notices for the 2025 UWMP and conducted a public hearing on June 9, 2026 to consider the approval of the 2025 UWMP.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BUENA PARK, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 13.28 (WATER CONSERVATION AND WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE PROGRAM) OF THE BUENA PARK MUNICIPAL CODE TO ENACT WATER CONSERVATION AND WATER SHORTAGE CONTINGENCY RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS OF EXEMPTION FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT (CEQA)

WHEREAS, Article X, Section 2 of the California Constitution and Section 100 of the California Water Code declare that, because of conditions prevailing in the State of California (the "State"), the State's policy is that the general welfare requires putting the State's water resources to beneficial use to the fullest extent of which the water resources are capable, preventing the waste or unreasonable use of water, and exercising water conservation with a view to the reasonable and beneficial use of water in the interest of the people and the public welfare;

WHEREAS, Article XI, Section 7 of the California Constitution declares that a city may make and enforce within its limits all local, police, sanitary, and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws;

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Water Code Section 375, after holding a public hearing, any public entity that supplies water for the benefit of persons within its service area may, by ordinance or resolution, after a public hearing upon notice and making specified findings of necessity, adopt and enforce a water conservation program to reduce the quantity of water uses by those persons for the purpose of conserving the water supplies of the public entity;

WHEREAS, the City of Buena Park ("City") is a public entity that supplies water service within its service area, and on June 9, 2026, the City Council for the City held a noticed public hearing pursuant to Water Code Section 375 to receive public comments regarding this ordinance and the Water Shortage Contingency Plan adopted contemporaneously herewith;

WHEREAS, based on all evidence presented to and considered by the City Council during the public hearing, the City Council finds and determines that because of prevailing water supply conditions within the State of California, and the declared policy of the State, it is necessary and appropriate for the City to adopt, implement, and enforce, by way of this ordinance, water conservation rules and regulations and response actions that reduce water consumption through conservation and efficiency so as to ensure and maximize the reasonable, efficient, and beneficial use of the City's water supply; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds and determines it is necessary and appropriate for the City to implement and enforce, by way of this ordinance, water shortage contingency rules and regulations during periods of water shortages and emergencies to ensure that there is sufficient water for human consumption, sanitation, fire protection, and/or similar uses benefiting the common good and public.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUENA PARK DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Based on all evidence presented to and considered by the City Council during the public hearing concerning this ordinance, the City Council hereby finds and determines that findings set forth in Section 13.28.020 of Chapter 13.28 hereinbelow are true, correct, and incorporated as a substantive part of this ordinance.

Section 2: Chapter 13.28 (WATER CONSERVATION AND WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE PROGRAM) of the Buena Park Municipal Code is hereby entirely deleted and replaced with the following:

**CHAPTER 13.28
WATER CONSERVATION AND WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE PROGRAM**

§ 13.28.010. Title.

This chapter will be known as the City of Buena Park Water Conservation and Water Supply Shortage Program.

§ 13.28.020. Findings.

- A. A reliable minimum supply of potable water is essential to the public health, safety and welfare of the people and economy of the southern California region.
- B. Southern California is a semi-arid region and is largely dependent upon imported water supplies. A growing population and economy, variable climate conditions, and increasing environmental concerns, among other concerns, make the region highly susceptible to water supply reliability issues.
- C. Careful water management that includes active water conservation measures not only in times of drought, but at all times, is essential to ensure a reliable minimum supply of water to meet current and future water supply needs.
- D. Article XI, Section 7 of the California Constitution declares that a city or county may make and enforce within its limits all local, police, sanitary, and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws.
- E. Article X, Section 2 of the California Constitution declares that the general welfare requires that water resources be put to beneficial use, waste or unreasonable use or unreasonable method of use of water be prevented, and conservation of water be fully exercised with a view to the reasonable and beneficial use thereof.
- F. Consistent with California Water Code Section 375, the city, as public agency that provides water service, has adopted a comprehensive water conservation program to reduce water consumption and conserve supplies, as the same may be amended from time to time.

- G. Consistent with California Water Code Section 10632, the city, as an urban water supplier, has prepared and adopted a Water Shortage Contingency Plan that describes how the City will respond to future water shortages and lists the various actions the City would take to reduce water demand under different water shortage scenarios.
- H. California Water Code Sections 350 *et seq.*, authorizes the city council for the city, as a distributor of a public water supply, after holding a properly noticed public hearing and after making certain findings, to declare a water shortage (emergency) and to adopt such regulations and restrictions to conserve the water supply for the greatest public benefit with particular regard for domestic use, sanitation, and fire protection.
- I. The adoption and enforcement of a water conservation and supply shortage program is necessary to manage the city's potable water supply in the short and long-term and to avoid or minimize the effects of drought and shortage within the city. Such program is essential to ensure a reliable and sustainable minimum supply of water for the public health, safety and welfare.

§ 13.28.030. Declaration of purpose and intent.

- A. This chapter establishes a water conservation, efficiency, and supply shortage program that will reduce water consumption within the city through conservation, enable effective water supply planning, assure reasonable and beneficial use of water, prevent waste of water, and maximize the efficient use of water within the city to avoid and minimize the effect and hardship of water shortage to the greatest extent possible.
- B. This chapter establishes permanent water conservation and efficiency standards intended to alter behavior related to water use efficiency for non-shortage conditions and further establishes three phases of water supply shortage response actions to be implemented during times of declared water shortage or declared water shortage emergency, with increasing restrictions on water use in response to worsening drought or emergency conditions and decreasing supplies.

§ 13.28.040. Definitions.

The following words and phrases whenever used in this chapter have the meaning defined in this section:

"Billing unit" means the unit of water used to apply water rates for purposes of calculating water charges for a person's water usage and equals one thousand gallons of water.

"City" means the city of Buena Park.

"City council" means the City Council for the city.

"City clerk" means the City Clerk for the city.

"City manager" means the City Manager for the city.

"Landscape irrigation system" means an irrigation system with pipes, hoses, spray heads, or sprinkling devices that are operated by hand or through an automated system.

"Large landscape areas" means a lawn, landscape, or other vegetated area, or combination thereof, equal to more than one acre of irrigable land.

"Person" means any natural person or persons, corporation, public or private entity, governmental agency or institution, or any other user of water provided by the city, and includes but is not limited to customers of the water system.

"Potable water" means water which is suitable for drinking.

"Recycled water" means the reclamation and reuse of non-potable water for beneficial use.

"Single pass cooling systems" means equipment where water is circulated only once to cool equipment before being disposed.

"Water code" means the California Water Code.

"Water shortage" means circumstances where the city's current or anticipated water supply cannot or will not meet water customers' ordinary demands or requirements without depleting the city's baseline water supply.

"Water shortage emergency" means circumstances where the city's current or anticipated water supply cannot or will not meet water customers' ordinary demands or requirements without resulting in there being insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation, and/or fire protection.

"Water Shortage Contingency Plan" means the Water Shortage Contingency Plan prepared and approved by resolution of the city council pursuant to Water Code Section 10632, as such plan may be amended from time to time.

"Water system" means the system of pipes, wells, and associated appurtenances and water rights owned by the city for the purpose of providing water service to persons within the service area.

§ 13.28.050. Application.

- A. The provisions of this chapter apply to any person in the use of any potable water provided by the city water system.
- B. The provisions of this chapter do not apply to uses of water necessary to protect public health and safety or for essential government services, such as police, fire and other similar emergency services.
- C. The provisions of this chapter do not apply to the use of recycled water, except as otherwise expressly provided herein.

- D. The provisions of this chapter do not apply to the use of water by commercial nurseries and commercial growers to sustain plants, trees, shrubs, crops or other vegetation intended for commercial sale.
- E. This chapter is intended solely to further the conservation and efficient uses of water. It is not intended to implement any provision of federal, state, or local statutes, ordinances, or regulations relating to protection of water quality or control of drainage or runoff. Refer to the local jurisdiction or Regional Water Quality Control Board for information on any stormwater ordinances and stormwater management plans.

§ 13.28.060. Permanent water conservation requirements—Prohibition against waste.

The following water conservation requirements are effective at all times and are permanent. Violations of this section will be considered waste and an unreasonable use of water.

- A. **Prohibition on Waste.** No person shall commit waste of any water from the city's water system. For purposes of the foregoing, "waste" shall mean and include the use of water for any purpose or in any manner that violates the requirements of this chapter, any conservation requirement or remedial action under authority of this chapter, or as the waste of water is otherwise defined by the Water Code.
- B. **Limits on Watering Hours.** Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water is prohibited between the hours of nine a.m. and six p.m. Pacific Standard Time on any day, except by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with a positive self-closing water shut-off nozzle or device, or for very short periods of time for the express purpose of adjusting or repairing an irrigation system.
- C. **Limit on Watering Duration.** Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area with potable water using a landscape irrigation system or a watering device that is not continuously attended is limited to no more than fifteen minutes watering per day per station. This subsection does not apply to landscape irrigation systems that exclusively use very low-flow drip type irrigation systems when no emitter produces more than two gallons of water per hour and weather based controllers or stream rotor sprinklers that meet a seventy percent efficiency standard.
- D. **No Excessive Water Flow or Runoff.** Watering or irrigating of any lawn, landscape or other vegetated area in a manner that causes excessive water flow or runoff onto an adjoining sidewalk, driveway, street, alley, gutter or ditch is prohibited.
- E. **No Watering Median Turf.** Watering or irrigating ornamental turf within public street medians is prohibited.
- F. **No Watering After Rain.** Watering or irrigating of lawn, landscape or other vegetated area is prohibited within 48 hours after measurable precipitation is experienced on the property.

- G. **No Washing Down Hard or Paved Surfaces.** Washing down hard or paved surfaces, including, but not limited to, sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking areas, tennis courts, patios or alleys, is prohibited except when necessary to alleviate safety or sanitary hazards, and then only by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container, a hand-held hose equipped with an automatic shut-off device, or a low-volume high-pressure cleaning machine that recycles used water.
- H. **Obligation to Fix Leaks, Breaks or Malfunctions.** Excessive use, loss or escape of water through breaks, leaks or other malfunctions in the water user's plumbing or distribution system for any period of time after such escape of water should have reasonably been discovered and corrected and in no event more than five days of receiving notice from the city, is prohibited.
- I. **Recirculating Water Required for Water Fountains and Decorative Water Features.** Operating a water fountain or other decorative water feature that does not use recirculated water is prohibited unless a waiver has been obtained.
- J. **Limits on Washing Vehicles.** Using water to wash or clean a vehicle, including, but not limited to, any automobile, truck, van, bus, motorcycle, boat or trailer, whether motorized or not is prohibited, except by use of a hand-held bucket or similar container or a hand-held hose equipped with an automatic shut-off nozzle or device. This subsection does not apply to any commercial car washing facility.
- K. **Drinking Water Served Upon Request Only.** Eating or drinking establishments, including, but not limited to, a restaurant, hotel, café, cafeteria, bar, club or other public place where food or drinks are sold, served, or offered for sale, are prohibited from providing drinking water to any person unless expressly requested.
- L. **Commercial Lodging Establishments Must Provide Option to Not Launder Linen Daily.** Hotels, motels and other commercial lodging establishments must provide customers the option of not having towels and linen laundered daily. Commercial lodging establishments must prominently display notice of this option in each bathroom using clear and easily understood language.
- M. **No Installation of Single Pass Cooling Systems.** Installation of single pass cooling systems is prohibited in buildings requesting new water service.
- N. **No Installation of Nonrecirculating in Commercial Car Wash and Laundry Systems.** Installation of nonrecirculating water systems is prohibited in new commercial conveyor car wash and new commercial laundry systems.
- O. **Restaurants Required to Use Water Conserving Dish Wash Spray Valves.** Food preparation establishments, such as restaurants or cafés, are prohibited from using non-water conserving dish wash spray valves.
- P. **Commercial Car Wash Systems.** Effective on January 1, 2011, all new commercial conveyor car wash systems must have installed operational recirculating water systems, or must have secured a waiver of this requirement from the city.
- Q. **Unauthorized Use of Hydrants.** The use of any fire hydrant without the authorization of the city is prohibited.

§ 13.28.070. Declaration of water shortages.

- A. Water Shortage Contingency Plan Governs. All findings and determinations made by the city manager or city council pursuant to this section, and the water conservation measures or remedial actions taken in response to a water shortage, are governed by the standards and criteria described in the Water Shortage Contingency Plan.
- B. Declaration of Water Shortage. If at any time the city manager determines that current or anticipated water supply cannot or will not meet ordinary demands or requirements of water system customers without depleting the city's baseline water supply, but the shortage is not sufficiently severe so as to be a water shortage emergency, then the city manager will report such facts and circumstances to the city council during an open and public meeting. The city council will consider the city manager's report and may, by resolution, declare a water shortage and indicate the applicable water shortage level.
- C. Adjustment of Level During Declared Shortage. If, during the existence of a declared water shortage, the city manager determines that current or anticipated changes to the water supply will improve or increase the severity of the water shortage, then the City Manager may implement a corresponding increase or decrease to the water shortage level. The city manager will report any changes made to the water shortage level to the city council during the next available public meeting, and the city council may, but is not obligated to, adopt a resolution affirming, modifying, or rescinding the water shortage level determination made by the city manager. The city manager's determination of the water shortage level will remain in effect absent action by the city council.
- D. Termination of Water Shortage Declaration. If, during the existence of a declared water shortage, the city manager determines that conditions associated with the current or anticipated water supply improve such that a water shortage no longer exists, then the city manager will report such facts and circumstances to the city council during an open and public meeting. The city council will consider the city manager's report and may, by resolution, terminate the water shortage declaration.
- E. Conservation Requirements During Declared Water Shortage. After and during the existence of a declared water shortage, the water conservation requirements and response actions that are applicable to the shortage level, as such water conservations requirements and response actions are detailed in the water shortage conservation plan, will take effect on the tenth day after the date on which the shortage level is declared. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event city implements water allocation as a shortage response action, the allocation will be effective on the fifth day following mailed notice to impacted customers.

- F. Notice of Shortages. Within five days of the city council declaration of a water shortage, the city clerk will publish a copy of the resolution in a newspaper used for the publication of official notices. In the event city implements water allocation as a shortage response action, the city will mail a notice to impacted customers by regular billing statement or any other mailing to the address to which the city customarily mails the billing statement for water fees or charges. The city will notify relevant stakeholders, local, regional and state governments, and other interested parties of the effective date of the water shortage declaration, the shortage level, and any applicable conservation requirements or response actions that are associated with the shortage level declared.

§ 13.28.080. Emergency and Catastrophic Water Shortages.

- A. Declaration of Water Shortage Emergency. If, at any time, the city manager determines that the ordinary demands and requirements of water system consumers cannot be satisfied without depleting the city's water supply to such an extent that there would be insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation, and/or fire protection, then the city manager will, in compliance with Water Code section 350 *et seq.*, schedule and notice a public hearing for purposes of reporting such facts and circumstances for consideration by the city council at a public meeting. Notice of the public hearing will be in a newspaper at least ten days before the scheduled hearing. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a noticed public hearing shall not be required in the event of a wildfire, a deenergization event, or a breakage or failure of a dam, pump, pipeline, or conduit causing an immediate emergency. The city council will consider the city manager's report and any evidence or protests offered at the hearing, may, by resolution, make the required findings and declare a water shortage emergency.
- B. Conservation Requirements and Response Actions During Emergency. After and during the existence of a declared water emergency, the mandatory conservation requirements and response actions applicable to the level of the water shortage emergency, as detailed in the Water Shortage Contingency Plan, will take effect on the date the shortage level is declared. In the event city implements water allocation as a shortage response action, the allocation will be effective on the fifth day following a mailed notice to impacted customers.
- C. Additional Response Actions. In addition to the generally prohibited uses of water set forth in this chapter, and any applicable water conservation measures or response actions detailed in the Water Shortage Contingency Plan, the city may take and implement additional water conservation measures or response actions during a water shortage emergency including, without limitation: reducing water allocations in all categories to meet the available water supply; shutting off all non-essential water uses; and other prohibited water uses as reasonably determined by the city to be necessary and appropriate under the circumstances presented.
- D. Termination of Water Shortage Emergency. If at any time during the existence of a declared water emergency, the city manager determines that conditions associated with the emergency no longer exist, then the city manager will report such facts and circumstances to the city council during an open and public meeting. The city council will consider the city manager's report and may, by resolution, terminate the water shortage emergency.

- E. Notice of Water Supply Shortage Emergency. Within five days of the city council declaration of a water shortage emergency, the city clerk will publish a copy of the resolution in a newspaper used for the publication of official notices. If the city establishes a water allocation, the city will provide notice of the allocation as soon as is practical under the catastrophic or emergency circumstances presented by including it in the regular billing statement or by any other mailing to the address to which the city customarily mails the billing statement for fees or charges for ongoing water service.

§ 13.28.090. City Manager authority.

If, at any time, the city manager determines that sudden events, facts, or circumstances have, or imminently threaten to, significantly diminish the reliability or quality of the city's water supply, the city manager may declare a catastrophic water shortage and implement or impose such emergency water allocations or water shortage response actions as may be reasonably necessary. The city manager will present such declaration and supporting facts and circumstances to the city council at the next available public meeting. The city council will consider the city manager's report and may, by resolution, affirm or rescind the declaration. The city manager's determination will remain in effect unless and until there is action by the city council.

§ 13.28.100. Other provisions.

- A. Limits on Building Permits. During the existence of a water shortage or water shortage emergency, the city may limit or withhold the issuance of building permits which require new or expanded water service, except to protect the public health, safety and welfare, or in cases which meet the city's adopted conservation offset requirements.
- B. Customer Water Conservation Reports. The city may, by written request, require all commercial, residential and industrial customers using ten thousand or more billing units per year to submit a water conservation plan and to submit quarterly progress reports on such plan. The conservation plan must include recommendations for increased water savings, separation of uses including increased water recycling based on feasibility, and the reports must include progress to date on implementation of such recommendations.
- C. Reporting Mechanism—Hotline. The city may establish a water waste hotline for residents to report violations of this chapter.

§ 13.28.110. Hardship waiver.

- A. Undue and Disproportionate Hardship. If, due to unique circumstances, a specific requirement of this chapter would result in undue hardship to a person using water or to property upon which water is used, that is disproportionate to the impacts to water users generally or to similar property of classes of water users, then the person may apply for a waiver to the requirements as provided in this section.

- B. Written Finding. The waiver may be granted or conditionally granted only upon a written finding of the existence of facts demonstrating an undue hardship to a person using water or to property upon which water is used, that is disproportionate to the impacts to water users generally or to similar property or classes of water use due to specific and unique circumstances of the user or the user's property.
1. Application. Application for a waiver must be on a form prescribed by the city and accompanied by a non-refundable processing fee in an amount set by city council resolution.
 2. Supporting Documentation. The application must be accompanied by photographs, maps, drawings, and other information, including a written statement of the applicant.
 3. Required Findings for Waiver. An application for a waiver will be denied unless the city manager finds, based on the information provided in the application supporting documents, or such additional information as may be requested, and on water use information for the property as shown by the records of the city or its agent, all of the following:
 - i. That the waiver does not constitute a grant of special privilege inconsistent with the limitations upon other residents and businesses;
 - ii. That because of special circumstances applicable to the property or its use, the strict application of this chapter would have a disproportionate impact on the property of use that exceeds the impacts to residents and businesses generally;
 - iii. That the authorizing of such waiver will not be of substantial detriment to adjacent properties, and will not materially affect the ability of the city to effectuate the purpose of this chapter and will not be detrimental to the public interest; and
 - iv. That the condition or situation of the subject property or the intended use of the property for which the waiver is sought is not common, recurrent or general in nature.
 4. Approval Authority. The city manager or designee must act upon any completed application no later than ten days after submittal and may approve, conditionally approve, or deny the waiver. The applicant requesting the waiver must be promptly notified in writing of any action taken. Unless specified otherwise at the time a waiver is approved, the waiver will apply to the subject property during the period of the mandatory water supply shortage condition. The decision of the city manager will be final.

§ 13.28.120. Penalties and violations.

- A. Misdemeanor. Any violation of this chapter may be prosecuted as a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than thirty days, or by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or by both.
- B. Civil Penalties. Civil penalties for failure to comply with any provisions of the chapter shall be as set forth in the city's fee schedule for this chapter, as may be adopted by resolution of the city council from time to time, or if no such schedule has been adopted as follows:
 - 1. First Violation. The city will issue a written warning and deliver a copy of this chapter by mail.
 - 2. Second Violation. A second violation within the preceding twelve calendar months is punishable by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars.
 - 3. Third Violation. A third violation within the preceding twelve calendar months is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars.
 - 4. Fourth and Subsequent Violations. A fourth and any subsequent violation is punishable by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars.
- C. Termination of Service. In addition to other remedies herein, the city may disconnect and/or terminate a customer's water service. A person or entity that violates this chapter resulting in service disconnection is responsible for payment of the city's charges for disconnecting and/or reconnecting service per the city's schedule of charges then in effect. Nonpayment will be subject to the same remedies as nonpayment of basic water rates.
- C. Separate Offenses. Each day that a violation of this chapter occurs is a separate offense.
- D. Notice and Hearing:
 - 1. The city will issue a notice of violation by mail or personal delivery at least ten days before taking noncriminal enforcement action as authorized herein. Such notice must describe the violation and the date by which corrective action must be taken. A violator may appeal the notice of violation by filing a written notice of appeal with the city clerk no later than the close of business on the day before the date scheduled for enforcement action. Any notice of violation not timely appealed will be final. Upon receipt of a timely appeal, a hearing before the director of public works, or designee, on the appeal will be scheduled, and the city will mail written notice of the hearing date to the violator at least ten days before the date of the hearing.
 - 2. Pending receipt of a written appeal or pending a hearing pursuant to an appeal, the city may take appropriate steps to prevent the unauthorized use of water as appropriate to the nature and extent of the violations and the current declared water phase condition.

- F. A violation of this chapter shall constitute a nuisance and may be abated by the city through civil process by means of restraining order, preliminary or permanent injunction or in any other manner provided by law for the abatement of such nuisances.

Section 3: This ordinance is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to California Water Code section 10652 which states that CEQA does not apply to the preparation, adoption, or implementation of Water Shortage Contingency Plans or water management plans.

Section 4: Severability. The City Council declares that, should any provision, section; paragraph, sentence or word of this ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction, or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences, and words of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 5: Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its passage and adoption pursuant to California Government Code section 36937.

Section 6: The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published in the manner prescribed by law.

DISCUSSION

Visit Buena Park, the City's tourism marketing division, saw a steady start to the year, with transient occupancy tax (TOT) revenues increasing 1.5% in January and 5.9% in February, and holding steady in March. While overall hotel supply was reduced by 11.2% due to recent property closures, performance indicators remained stable. Occupancy rose consistently from 64% in January to 70% in February and 76% in March.

Through targeted marketing, media coverage, and digital outreach, Visit Buena Park is reaching high-intent travelers, driving overnight stays, and delivering strong returns for the City. From January through April, these efforts generated more than 414K visits to VisitBuenaPark.com.

Visit Buena Park's strategic public relations initiatives played a central role in achieving these results. From January - April, staff hosted 11 travel influencers, resulting in media coverage reaching over 5.28M readers, viewers, and digital consumers. Content development and proactive media pitching generated over 26.8M impressions.

In January, advertising placements appeared in major travel publications including the *Anaheim Travel Guide* (250k+ circulation) and the *Visit California Travel Guide* (500k+ circulation). In May, Buena Park received national recognition with a two-page spread in *Parade Magazine's* "America's Favorite Small Towns" issue, highlighting 40 finalist destinations from across the country. Buena Park was one of only three California cities nominated, alongside Lodi and Crescent City. The special issue had a national distribution of 100,000 copies and was sent to major magazine retailers, including supermarkets, mass merchants, and bookstores.

Visit Buena Park received significant broadcast and media exposure in 2026 to date, reaching millions of potential visitors across key markets. Travel expert Emily Kaufman, “The Travel Mom,” highlighted Buena Park in segments airing in Houston, Denver, and Portland, reaching an audience of 335K+ viewers. “Best of California with Pat Pattison” featured Buena Park twice — once in a “Hidden Gems in California” segment and again in “Home Sweet Home in California”—each delivering an audience of about 10 million viewers across Los Angeles/Orange County and Palm Springs markets. The Jo Clark Podcast showcased a “Foodie Trail in Orange County,” reaching approximately 2 million listeners across streaming platforms. Additional coverage included a feature on KING 5 during an Olympic special, generating 2.19 million impressions, 665K views, and 177K engagements. Buena Park was also highlighted in AAA’s podcast and video series focused on must-visit Orange County destinations, generating 605 listens and more than 334K video views. Seattle Refined on KOMO ABC 4 highlighted summer fun in Buena Park, generating 100K impressions and approximately 20K viewers. In San Diego, The Localist on Fox 5 delivered 154K viewers with a segment focused on “The Ultimate Playcation—Everyone Plays Their Way in Buena Park, CA.” Chicago Live on WGN9 brought in 54K views, positioning Buena Park as an unexpected Southern California getaway filled with immersive experiences. Your California Life on ABC 10 reached 20K viewers with a feature on the destination, while Sacramento’s CBS 13 delivered a combined reach of 87,292 through a “Pro Tips on Southern California: Buena Park” segment.

Paid social media platforms continue to serve as a primary driver of traffic to Visit Buena Park’s website, accounting for over 56% of total sessions. Meta (Facebook and Instagram) alone generated more than 511K ThruPlays, reflecting strong video engagement and audience retention. Meta even recognized Visit Buena Park’s efforts with two badges—Original Creator and Emerging Talent. Our integrated content strategy across YouTube, TikTok, Pinterest, and Meta continues to strengthen brand visibility and reinforce traveler intent throughout the visitor journey.

Building on this momentum, Buena Park recently launched a “Home Game” baseball-focused social media campaign targeting key feeder markets in January. The campaign is designed to reach travel baseball enthusiasts, the second most likely sports audience to travel for games after football. Through April, it has generated over 464K impressions, 20K clicks, and 17K engagements, while maintaining a highly efficient \$0.24 cost per click on a total ad spend of \$4K.

Digital advertising continues to play a key role in driving interest in Buena Park, accounting for roughly 30% of total website traffic through campaigns across Google platforms and cooperative partnerships with Visit California, including placements on networks like Expedia. Notably, the Expedia campaign delivered the strongest return, generating more than \$10.1 million in hotel revenue from January through April. In addition to these core efforts, Visit Buena Park is also participating in a regional Expedia FIFA World Cup cooperative campaign with Los Angeles and Orange County, which will run through mid-June and is targeting soccer enthusiasts and high-intent travelers. We are also currently testing new generative response ads designed to create more interactive and personalized engagement with potential visitors, further enhancing how we connect with and convert travel audiences.

Visit Buena Park continues to expand its digital reach through connected TV (CTV) platforms, including Hulu and Disney+, with evergreen “Land of Yes” video campaigns strategically targeted to high-intent travel audiences. These campaigns are continuously tested and optimized for performance, incorporating KERV’s embedded QR code technology to drive engagement and track response. The campaign has generated more than 750K video views with a strong 99% video completion rate, and it will continue running through June 2026.

Visit Buena Park staff remained actively engaged in key travel trade and industry events in 2026 to build valuable partnerships. This included a virtual presentation at the Visit California Japan Seminar in Osaka with 86 attendees, as well as a virtual Visit California Canada event that connected with more than 60 travel trade professionals. Staff also participated in the Go West Summit in Las Vegas, conducting over 36 one-on-one appointments with qualified buyers. In addition, a travel trade training contest launched for the month of February generated strong engagement, with more than 350 tour operators, agents, and meeting planners completing the Buena Park training module. Staff also introduced a new conference this year - Small Market Meetings which focuses on attracting smaller-scale meetings and events that can be accommodated within six of the city's hotel properties.

Two City Council Members calendared separate agenda items related to public on-street parking within the City. Council Member Sonne requested a review of potential strategies to increase public parking availability in residential neighborhoods impacted by the addition of Preferential Parking Districts (PPDs) and the resulting reduction in available on-street parking. Separately, Council Member Ahn requested that the City Council consider opportunities to increase public parking capacity along 8th Street. Council Member Ahn's request was related to the approval of a PPD in this area for the residential community along Coronet Circle, Savoy Circle, and Victoria Circle.

Staff reviewed both calendared items and determined that the parking concerns identified in each item are related and would be most effectively addressed through a single, comprehensive report and study session discussion. Accordingly, this report combines both requests and is organized into two sections. The first section addresses citywide public parking concerns associated with the expansion of PPDs and strategies to increase public parking availability. The second section focuses specifically on parking conditions and opportunities to increase parking capacity on 8th Street, specifically between Knott and Western Avenues.

PART A: Citywide Parking Impacts Related to Preferential Parking District Expansion

The City has experienced an increase in requests for Preferential Parking Districts (PPDs) in recent years, primarily in response to spill-over parking demand from commercial uses, transit riders at the Metrolink Station, and older multi-family residential areas. Currently, there are 15 PPDs throughout the City. Out of these, five (5) were established within the last five (5) years. While PPDs are intended to protect residential parking availability for neighborhood residents, the expansion of permit-restricted parking on public streets has reduced the amount of unrestricted public on-street parking available to visitors, service providers, and residents in nearby areas. As a result, concerns have been raised regarding parking displacement and increased competition for available on-street parking spaces.

1. Potential On-Street Strategies to Increase Parking Capacity

Staff evaluated a range of potential strategies that could increase public parking availability in residential neighborhoods impacted by PPDs. The strategies reviewed include both short-term operational approaches and longer-term capital or policy solutions. Each option presents varying levels of effectiveness, cost, implementation complexity, and neighborhood impact.

a. Angled Parking Stalls (On-Street)

In locations where street width and traffic circulation allow, converting parallel parking to angled parking could significantly increase the number of on-street spaces. This approach may also have a traffic calming effect by visually narrowing the roadway. However, implementation would require detailed engineering review, as many residential streets do not have sufficient width to safely accommodate angled parking while maintaining emergency vehicle access and adequate sight distance at driveways and intersections. Additionally, vehicles backing out into the street from an angled parking space increase the potential for low-speed collisions.

Costs associated with angled parking conversion would primarily include roadway re-striping, signage modifications, and potential curb or roadway improvements, and would generally be considered moderate depending on the extent of improvements required. Staff has created a standard plan showing how angled parking can be implemented and the circumstances for when it would increase on-street parking supply.

c. Parking Within City Parks or Other City-Owned Property

Existing City-owned properties, including park sites and other underutilized parcels, could be evaluated for limited public parking opportunities. This option would provide additional off-street parking in specific neighborhoods at a relatively low initial cost where city-owned parking lots already exist. However, implementation would require amendments to the Municipal Code (10.24.055), reduce the amount of parking available for other users, and create enforcement challenges associated with long-term vehicle storage.

The costs associated with this option may be relatively low and be limited to re-striping, signage and possibly lighting upgrades.

d. Development of Parking Lots or Parking Structures on City-Owned Parcels

The City could consider acquiring underutilized properties for the development of public parking lots or structured parking facilities. Surface parking lots generally represent a lower-cost alternative but require large lot size to generate meaningful parking capacity.

Development of surface parking lots would require property acquisition costs, environmental review, site improvements, paving, drainage, lighting, and ongoing maintenance expenditures. Structured parking garages include all of the pre-development costs associated with a surface lot, but also include very high capital costs to construct and would require identification of external funding sources or long-term financing mechanisms.

2. Potential Off-Street Strategies to Increase Parking Capacity

a. Private Parking Lift Incentive Program

The City could explore a grant or low-interest loan program to encourage apartment complexes and condominium developments to voluntarily install parking lift systems on private property. Such a program could increase off-street parking capacity without requiring City ownership or operation of the equipment. The cost to install a vehicle lift is approximately \$12,000 to \$15,000 per lift once site preparation, construction plans, permits and installation are factored in. As a result, any financial assistance program offered by the City would require identification of funding sources, development of eligibility requirements, and review by the City Attorney's Office.

c. Enforcement of Existing Garage Parking Requirements

Enhanced enforcement of existing requirements that garages be maintained for vehicle parking rather than storage could help preserve existing off-street parking capacity, particularly in neighborhoods where multi-family residential developments included garages rather than carports to provide onsite parking. While this strategy may reduce dependency on on-street parking in some neighborhoods, it would require regular and ongoing enforcement to ensure compliance and could be viewed by residents as selective enforcement if single-family homes were excluded from enforcement activities.

d. Re-Evaluating Existing No Parking Zones

Staff can re-evaluate the existing no parking zones that are in place for sight distance reasons and determine whether they can be reduced without compromising traffic safety, similar to the approach recently completed on Grand Avenue, to optimize parking. In that case, staff was successfully able to add quite a few parking spaces by implementing this strategy.

e. Development of a program to allow minor variations from zoning requirements for certain identified properties

Working with the Planning Division, a program could be developed that would allow for minor variations in development standards to increase onsite parking capacity. Examples could include the reduction of setbacks to allow for additional parking, or the removal of small portions of green space to allow for additional parking. This program would be limited to *existing* multi-family construction, and only in areas that have been identified by the City or community to have parking capacity concerns. The program would be administered through the Planning Division, and would allow property owners in high-demand parking areas some flexibility to create additional on-site parking.

Based on staff's preliminary review of the above-referenced programs/strategies, no single option can fully offset the reduction in unrestricted parking associated with the creation/expansion of PPDs. Some strategies, like angled parking and increased enforcement, identified by staff could potentially be implemented in the near term through operational or policy changes. Others, like parking lots and structures, would require substantial capital investment and further feasibility analysis.

PART B: 8th Street Parking Conditions and Opportunities to Increase Public Parking

8th Street west of Western Avenue is a two-lane residential collector street that intersects Knott Avenue at its western end. The street is approximately 36 feet wide and has a posted speed limit of 25 mph. Several residential streets, including Victoria, Coronet, Savoy, Gramercy, Rostrata, and Burnham, intersect 8th Street along this segment.

Both sides of the street, particularly the south side, are lined with residential driveways serving a mix of single- and multi-family residences. Gilbert Elementary School and George Bellis Park are located on the north side of the street. On-street parking is permitted on both sides of 8th Street, and the roadway is characterized by high on-street parking demand.

The single-family homes located along Victoria Circle, Coronet Circle, and Savoy Circle are currently part of a PPD while the predominantly multi-family developments along Gramercy Street, Rostrata Avenue and Burnham Avenue are not a part of a PPD.

The number of multi-family developments, along with the establishment of the PPD on several nearby streets has resulted in the limited availability of on-street parking in the area for residents and visitors who are not part of the PPD. Limited parking availability along 8th Street and adjacent roadways has created an inconvenience for non-PPD residents, visitors, and guests seeking parking in this area.

On 8th Street there are approximately 309 residential units (including the PPD), with approximately 129 on-street parking spaces. This significant imbalance between supply and demand further contributes to chronic parking shortages throughout the corridor and intensifies competition for available spaces.

Based on the existing roadway right-of-way width and constrained cross-sections along 8th Street, there are limited improvements that could be implemented which would significantly increase on-street parking capacity. Staff evaluated multiple parking and circulation scenarios; however, most alternatives were eliminated due to ROW width limitations, driveway access conflicts, and traffic safety considerations.

With on-street parking capacity increases limited, staff also reviewed the option to utilize public parking facilities at George Bellis Park located on the north side of 8th Street. Bellis Park has several parking areas available and contains approximately 118 parking stalls. A portion of these stalls could be allocated to address the parking demands in the area. Staff observed that the parking demand along 8th Street is most severe during overnight hours, when residents return home and on-street parking availability becomes limited.

Designating a limited number of parking stalls within Bellis Park parking lot for overnight residential parking use could be an option. The overnight parking period can be defined as 10:00 PM to 7:00 AM when the park is closed. These spaces would be clearly identified through appropriate signage and pavement markings to ensure enforceability and to minimize conflicts with daytime park users.

Additionally, residents have identified home-based vehicle-related businesses, including vehicle repair activities, as contributing to localized parking congestion. These types of home businesses are not permitted and, through increased Code Enforcement, have improved and may continue to improve parking availability in affected areas. Similar to enforcement of garage parking mentioned earlier in this report, this strategy requires ongoing Code Enforcement efforts and resources.

CONCLUSION

City Council direction is requested on which strategies should be prioritized for further analysis and development, including:

- Evaluation of City-owned properties for expanded or shared public parking use;
- Potential refinements to PPD policies, boundaries, or eligibility criteria;
- Targeted enforcement enhancements related to garage use and illegal commercial activity in residential areas;
- Consideration of a pilot program for overnight residential parking within the George Bellis Park parking lot (10:00 PM–7:00 AM), subject to further operational and community impact analysis;
- Development of an incentive program for apartments to provide on-site parking lifts; and,
- Development of a program that would allow zoning variances to allow more parking spaces and reduce setbacks to allow additional on-site parking at impacted apartments.

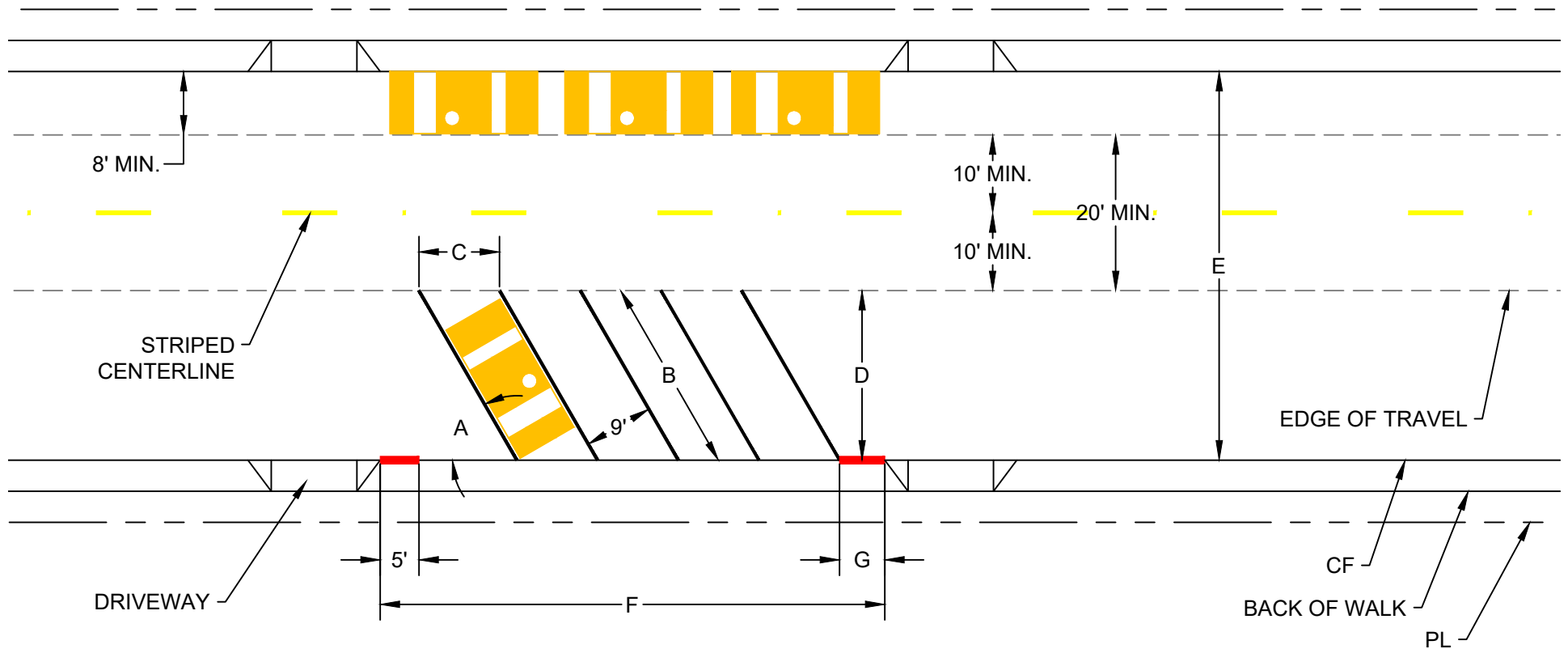

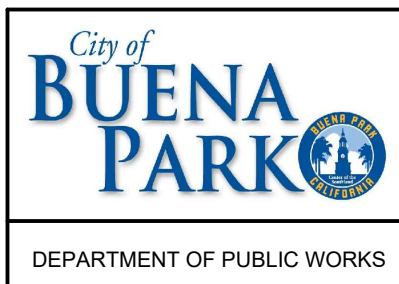

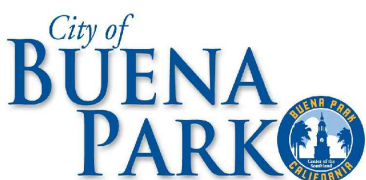
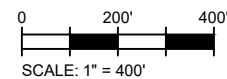
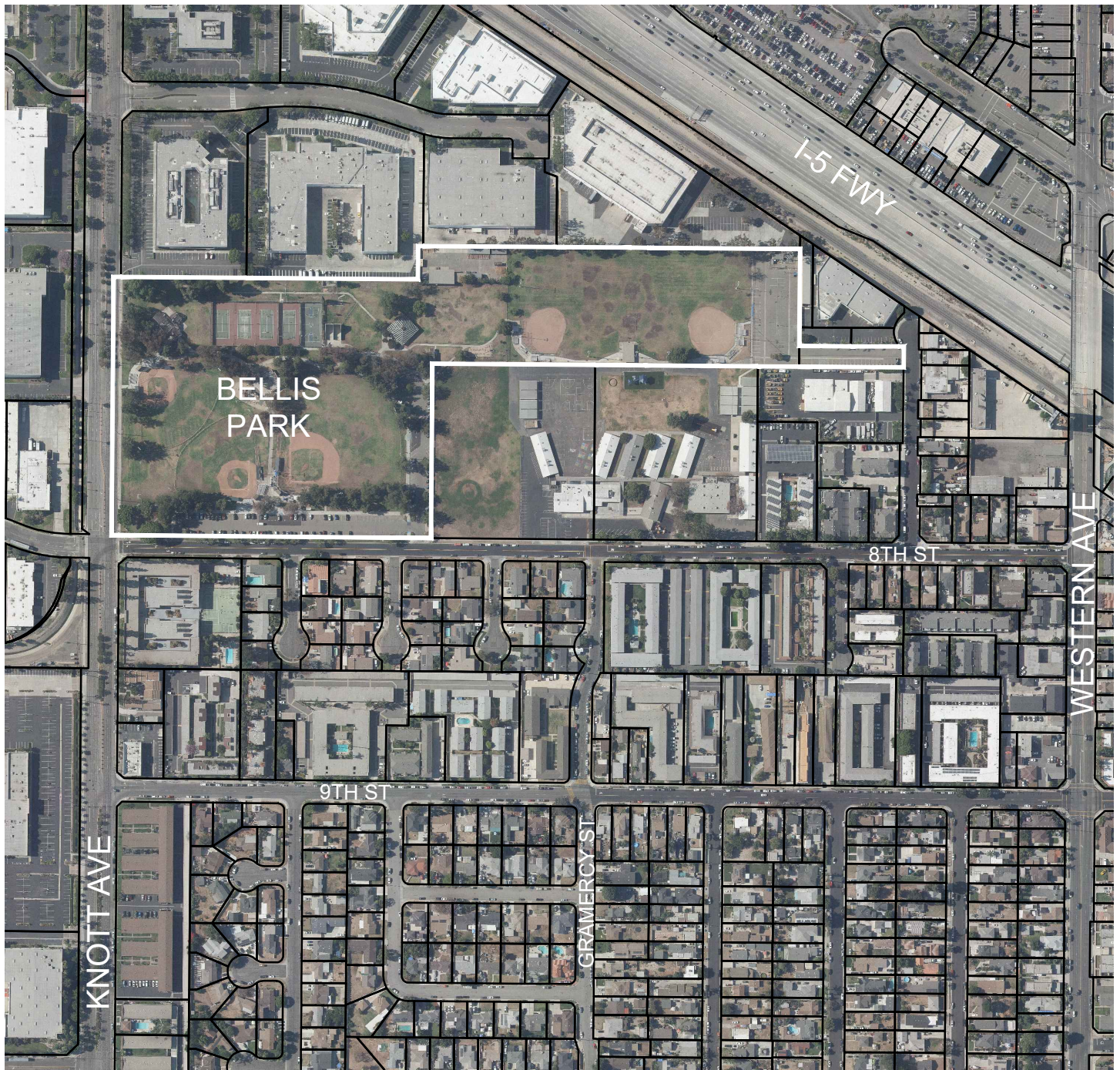
SPACE REQUIREMENTS FOR ANGLED PARKING STALLS

VICINITY MAP OF BELLIS PARK & 8TH STREET

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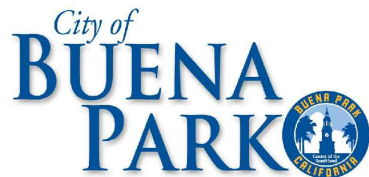

PARKING GUIDE FOR IMPACTED NEIGHBORHOODS

For Apartment Complex Property Owners and Managers

PURPOSE OF THIS GUIDE

This guide has been prepared by the City of Buena Park Planning Division to assist apartment complex owners and property managers in identifying opportunities to increase the number of on-site parking spaces within its property. The strategies described in this packet are designed to be low-cost, minimally disruptive, and consistent with the intent of the City's Zoning Ordinance.

The City recognizes that many existing multifamily properties were developed under older parking standards and may face parking impacts as tenant vehicle ownership has increased. Rather than require costly structural changes, the City has developed a review process for minor site modifications that can yield increased parking supply.

Who should use this guide: This packet is intended for owners and managers of apartment complexes in Buena Park that are experiencing parking deficiencies, whether through tenant complaints, unauthorized parking in aisles, or vehicles overflowing onto adjacent public rights-of-way.

SECTION 1 — PARKING REQUIREMENTS MUNICIPAL CODE

The parking standards for multifamily residential properties in Buena Park are contained in Chapter 19.436 of Title 19 (Zoning Ordinance) of the Buena Park Development Code. A summary of the key provisions is provided below.

1.1 Minimum Parking Spaces Required (§19.436.050)

Every lot used for multifamily residential purposes must provide sufficient off-street parking to meet the demand created by all activities on the lot. The minimum requirements are set by unit type as shown in Table 1 below.

Note: Additional parking requirements may be required as a condition of site plan review, conditional use permit, or other development approval applicable to the property.

1.2 Parking Dimensions and Layout (§19.436.070)

The layout of all residential parking areas must meet the standards in Table 19.436.070 of the Zoning Ordinance. The key dimensional standards are summarized in Table 2:

1.3 Compact Car Parking

Up to 30% of required parking spaces may be designated for compact car parking. Compact spaces must:

- Be a minimum of 8 feet wide and 16 feet in depth
- Be clearly marked on the pavement with "COMPACT" signage
- Not be substituted for covered/enclosed required spaces unless approved by the Director

1.4 Parking Location (§19.436.060)

The parking spaces required must be located on the same parcel as the dwelling units they serve.

1.5 Parking Improvements (§19.436.080)

All parking areas must be graded and drained to dispose of surface water. Drainage must be arranged to prevent surface flow across walkways and driveways. Security lighting must be provided in all parking areas accessible after dark. Parking areas must be:

- Paved with concrete or asphalt and maintained in good condition
- Striped and clearly marked
- Providing adequate internal circulation so vehicles do not need to back onto a public street
- Separated from landscaped areas by a 6-inch-high concrete curb at all boundaries

SECTION 2 — STRATEGIES TO INCREASE PARKING SPACES

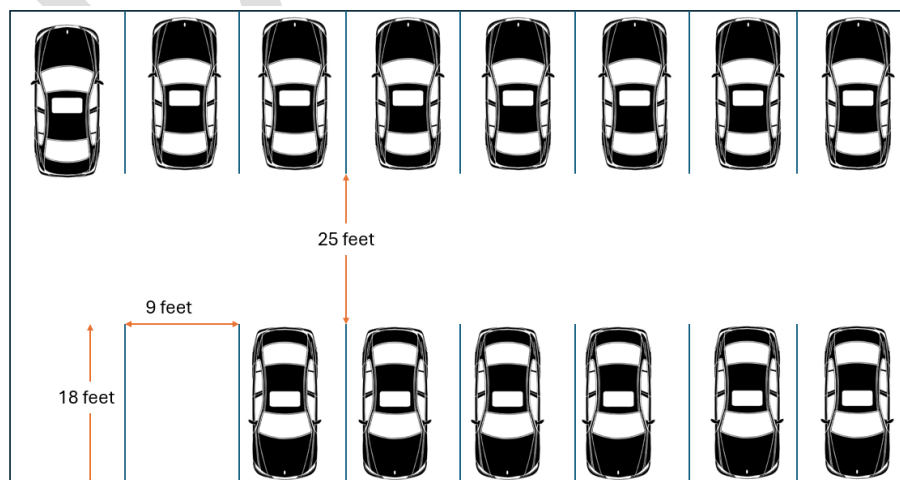
The following strategies have been identified that can increase on-site parking supply at most apartment complexes. Each strategy has been reviewed by the City and is eligible for an expedited administrative review (Interdepartmental Review) under the City Council's Parking Impacted Neighborhoods Program. A summary of all strategies and their approximate potential is shown in Table 3 below:

TABLE 3: PARKING STRATEGIES SUMMARY

Parking Capacity Strategy	Cost	Estimated Gain	Key Considerations
Reduce Stall Width (9 ft → 8 ft)	Low	1 - 2 spaces	Mark stalls COMPACT; applies to up to 30% of lot
Reduce Drive Aisle Width (One-way 20' min. and two-way 25' min.)	Low	1 row	Fire Dept. approval required for one-way 20' min. drive aisle width.
Interior parking lot landscaping not adjacent to a street, single-family zones, or residential structure	Medium	1 - 2 spaces	Retain 3 ft min. strip; use drought-tolerant plants
Parallel Spaces Along Walls	Low–Medium	2 - 8 spaces	8 ft x 22 ft per standard space and 7 ft x 20 ft per compact space; works along long walls; shall maintain required drive aisle width and 30% compact space maximum
Convert Landscape Areas	Medium	1 - 4 spaces	Requires permit; drainage must be maintained. Does not apply to required common usable open space landscaped areas
Tandem Spaces (assigned only)	Low	1–4 spaces	Permissible for assigned resident spaces

2.1 Standard 90° Parking Layout (Existing Baseline)

Figure 1 below illustrates the typical existing parking configuration found at most apartment complexes in Buena Park. Understanding this baseline layout is the starting point for identifying where modifications can yield additional spaces.



2.2 Reducing Aisle Width and Parking Space Width

Reducing the drive aisle width and/or converting additional spaces from standard spaces to compact spaces can increase parking supply with minimal cost. This can free up enough linear footage to add one or two additional spaces.

Key considerations for this approach:

- The minimum drive aisle for two-way 90° parking is 25 feet. Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) review may be required to confirm reduced drive aisle width meets minimum emergency access requirements.
- Standard parking space widths may be reduced to 8-feet-wide for compact spaces. Up to 30% of total required spaces may be compact.
- This approach works best where 8 contiguous open non-obstructed parking spaces and 18 garage/carport spaces (26 total spaces) are provided to gain 1 space.

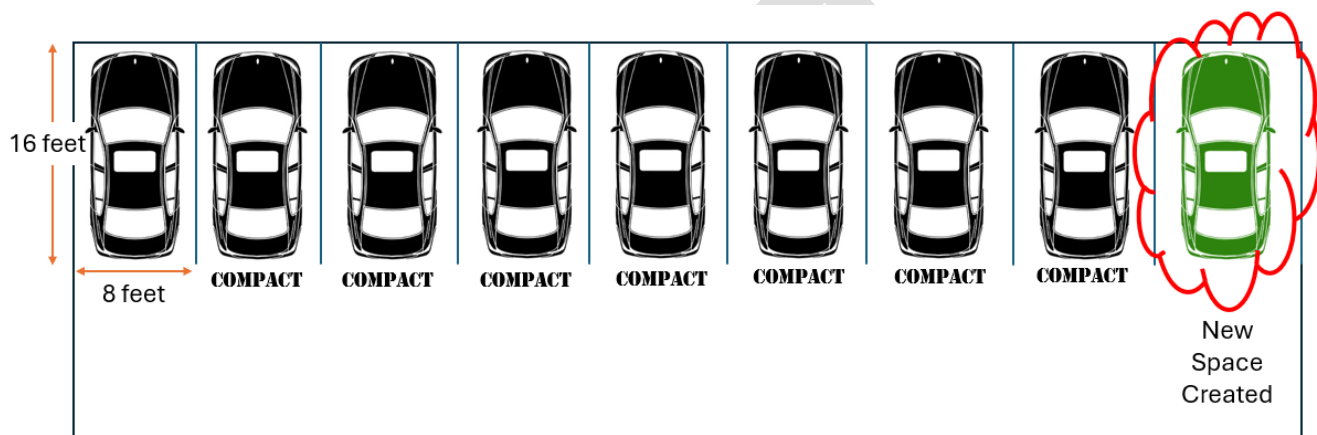


Figure 2 - Converting to Compact Spaces

2.3 Reducing Landscape Planters

Many apartment properties have interior planter areas that are 6 to 10 feet deep. By reducing these planters to a 3-foot minimum maintained strip, new 90° parking spaces can be created against the boundary wall.

Key considerations:

- Front-yard setback areas cannot be reduced or altered to increase parking. Any changes to landscaped areas shall be in the sides (non-street facing) or rear of the property.
- A minimum 3-foot landscaped strip must be maintained against all walls and property lines.
- Remaining planting must be drought-tolerant and maintained in good condition per BPMC Chapter 19.432 (Development Standards - Landscaping).
- The new parking area must be paved, striped, and provided with a 6-inch-high concrete curb at the landscape edge.
- An Interdepartmental Review application is required showing the existing planter dimensions, proposed reduction, and new parking space layout.

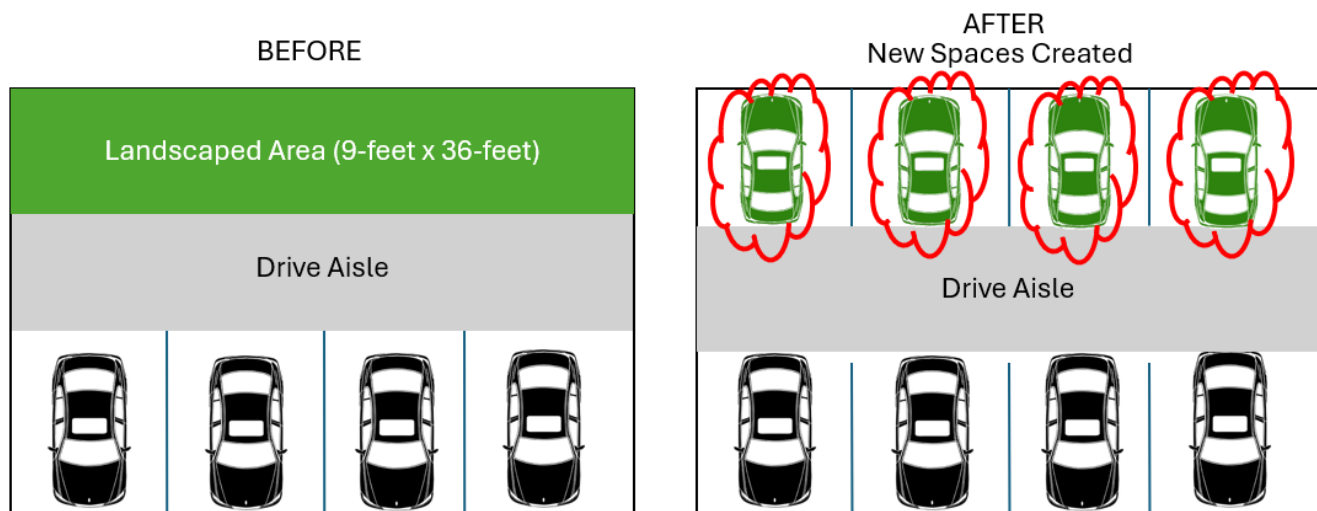


Figure 3 — Cutting Into Landscape Planters to Add Perpendicular Spaces

2.4 Parallel Parking Along Property Walls

Where the layout of the parking lot or access driveway does not allow for 90° stalls, parallel parking spaces can be added along long property walls, fences, or building faces. This is particularly useful in areas where there is existing unused paved or planter space running the length of a wall.

Key considerations:

- Each parallel space requires a minimum of 8 feet in width by 22 feet in length for standard parking spaces, and 7 ft in width by 20 ft in length for compact.
- Parallel spaces require adequate vehicle access from at least one end of the row — vehicles must be able to pull out without backing onto a public street.
- A 12-foot one-way access lane must be maintained adjacent to parallel spaces for vehicle ingress and egress.
- Parallel spaces are best suited to long straight wall runs of 50 feet or more.

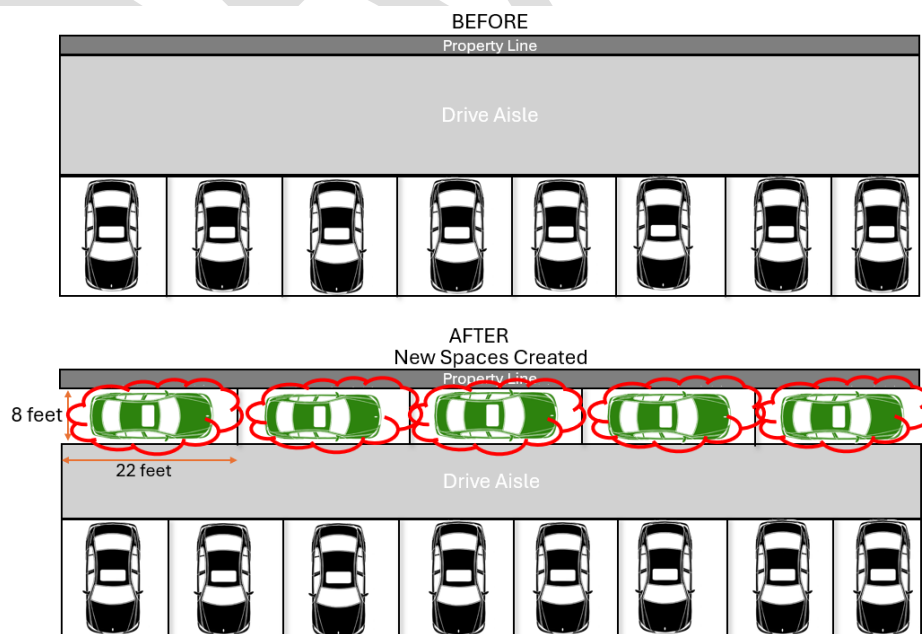


Figure 4 — Adding Parallel Spaces Along a Property Wall

2.5 Other Options

In addition to the strategies listed above, property owners may also consider:

- **Tandem spaces:** Two vehicles parked end-to-end in a single stall. These are permitted for assigned resident spaces and do not require a width greater than the standard stall. Tandem stalls must be assigned to the same unit and may not be used for visitor parking.
- **Converting unused utility or storage areas:** Some properties have paved areas used for storage or similar uses that could be partially reconfigured for additional parking. The City can evaluate these on a case-by-case basis.
- **Reconfiguring end-of-row areas:** The end of each parking row often has a radius turn that in some cases can be tightened or redesigned to allow an additional compact stall. Any modifications to turn radii must be reviewed by the Orange County Fire Authority and the City's franchise waste hauler (EDCO) for compliance.

SECTION 3 — PROGRAM PROCESS AND HOW TO APPLY

3.1 Review of Strategies for Parking-Impacted Properties

The City of Buena Park is offering an administrative review process (Interdepartmental Review) for parking space projects at existing multifamily apartment properties in specified areas of the City. The following types of minor modifications may be reviewed at the staff level without a requiring a public hearing:

- Reduction in planter width (to a minimum 3-foot strip) to create new perpendicular or parallel spaces;
- Reduction in drive aisle width (to a minimum 25 feet for two-way traffic);
- Reduction in parking stall width to 8 feet for up to 30% of spaces (compact spaces);
- Addition of parallel spaces along interior property walls or boundary fences (usually combined with a reduction in drive aisle width); and
- Conversion of unused paved areas to parking, provided drainage and access standards are maintained.

3.2 What You Will Need to Submit

To initiate an Administrative review, property owners, managers or their representative should submit the following:

- Interdepartmental Review Application online at www.buenapark.com/;
- A fully dimensioned site plan drawn to scale showing the existing parking layout, all landscaped areas, drive aisles, and property boundaries;
- A proposed site plan clearly showing the new or modified spaces, with dimensions for each stall, aisle widths, and planter strip dimensions;
- Photos of the existing parking areas and landscaping (minimum 4–6 photos);
- Property address, assessor's parcel number (APN), and contact information for the owner or authorized representative.

3.3 Fees and Timeline

Fee: Interdepartmental Review Fee is \$1,810.

Timeline: Once a complete application is received and paid, City staff will review and prepare a written response within 30 days.

3.4 Building Permits

After Planning IDR approval, a Building Permit and PW may be required for any physical work, including paving, striping, curb modifications, and landscaping changes. The IDR application process will identify is any building permits are required for the proposed alternations.
